Well Developed Case of Foolishness.

Chester Miller, aged 15 years, son of Mathew Miller was savagely beaten by the Peace W. N. Luckey and a Jury, Tuesday and tried on a charge of "defacing a building not his own." The complainant was C. A. This worldly jury took a radically different view from that of the class of professors and felt indignant to think that men drawing such good pay should exhibit such poor sense. They promptly agreed that the boy was not guilty, as the code did not apply to his case at all, and returned the following verdict:

State vs. Chester Miller—We, the jury impaneled in the above action find the defendant not guilty as charged and recommend that he be returned to school and properly punished by the school authorities.

Salem Woolen Mill Ruined.

Monday morning at 6 o'clock the Salem Woolen Mills caught fire in the dry house and was burned to the ground; loss, \$80,000; insurance \$20,000. Those who foreman of the Ashland Woolen Mills of this city in the first years of its career, was the originator and manager of the Salem mills, having built them in 1880, Salem people subscribing \$20,000 bonus. This catastrophe is a hard blow to Salem. The mill was the only one on the coast running night and day, through all the hard times. It gave employment from 50 to 60 hands, and expended large amounts of money throughout the northwest.

R. for business between Portland and San Francisco has assumed various proportions and the first of this week the railroad company cut the rates on its special flyer down to \$10 first class and \$5 second class, while the steamship company went down to \$5 and \$2.50 respectively. The steamship company's fare includes meals and berths. The railroad includes sleeping car berth. Yesterday the O. R. & N. commenced selling these tickets good for 10 days. The S. P. was expected to follow suit on the next flyer. The south bound Shasta Flyer that took dinner in Ashland yesterday showed the evidence of the cut rate, coming in two sections and having on board 300 passengers. The regular overland came in at same time with 50 passengers, making boom times for the hotel, restaurant and fruit stand business at depot.

Sheriff Hiatt of Josephine county is beginning to prepare for an ugly job he has on hand, the hanging of the wife murderer, Chas. Fiester, sentenced to hang on Friday, Nov. 22nd. Deputy Sheriff Fallon was at Jacksonville last week examining the scaffold and apparatus used by Sheriff B. Dean in the hanging of Lewis O'Neil at Jacksonville about 10 years ago for the murder of Lewis McDaniels on Church street, just opposite the present site of the Baptist church. Deputy Sheriff Fallon pronounces the Dean scaffold and trap door arrangement as being first-class and one that will fit the job exact for the Fiester job. The trap is sprung from a secret spring and no one needs to know when or by whom the job was done.

Deputy Sheriff Fallon says Sheriff Hiatt has received many applications for tickets to see the performance and strange to relate many young women of Grants Pass society have asked to see the hanging. The sheriff will not debar the "new woman" in gratifying her curiosity, though he expects to see a fainting spell when old man Fiester's body falls with a "dull sickening thud" on the noose and breaks his neck.

Ivan Kovalev has confessed to Madame Olga Gorlenko that he was present at the murder of F. H. L. Weber and his wife at Sacramento.

He says that he went with Mattheus Techerbakov to the Weber house with the intention of committing burglary. They ascended the back stairs and waited for a chance to make an entrance. While they were waiting Weber passed with a light. He went to the back door where Techerbakov was standing with an ax in his hand. He raised the ax and struck the old man several blows, Weber calling to his wife. After killing Weber, Kovalev and Techerbakov went into an adjoining room and the latter murdered Mrs. Weber with the ax. Kovalev does not say who used the knife, but he inferred that his accomplice did not use both weapons. Kovalev details the subsequent robbery of the Weber house and the escape of the murderers through the heavy fog which prevailed in Sacramento on that night.
