The First Quartz Mill in Oregon—Output the Pocket Mines.

Cameron & Boaz have sold a large tract of their mining ground near Uniontown to B. E. Toney and John Hattie or Johnson, who will dig up same with a first class hydraulic plant, and from the pay received in former years good results are anticipated.

McKenzie Unhappy, one of the principal stock holders in the Gold Basin mines near Kerby, Josephine county, has bonded for Frank Smith the Free and Easy quartz mine at that place for \$75,000 and begins a thorough prospecting of the same immediately.

Grants Pass Mining Journal. Jackson county had the honor of receiving the first quartz mill introduced into Oregon. The Gold Hill mine had just been discovered, and the owners were working in an arduous quartz worth a dollar a pound.

An Interview With the Populist Mayor of San Francisco.

In a recent interview, Mayor Sutro, Populist, of San Francisco, Cal. who is several times a millionaire, used the following language:
