HOTEL OREGON

Supreme Court Decisions. Handed down Monday:

Albert Walker, respondent, vs. Henry Bloomingcamp et al., appellants, from Klamath county. This is an action brought to recover for alledged trespass of defendants' sheep upon the unenclosed lands of plaintiff. The complaint alleges that the defendants unlawfully and willfully herded and permitted to be herded bands of sheep upon their lands. In its ruling the court: "Here the rule prevails that unenclosed and unimproved lands are regarded as common pasturage, and the owner, of stock may suffer them to go at large and despasture such lands without being liable in trespass therefor.' The opinion further states that the complaint does not aver that the sheep were purposely driven upon defendant's lands, as argued, and that the custom of grazing upon unenclosed lands has been in vogue in Oregon since its early settlement, and if the practice is to be changed, it should be by legislative enactment. The judgment of the lower court is reversed, and the cause remanded, with directions to sustain the demurrer to the complaint. Opinion by Bean, C. J.
