Can Poverty Be Abolished?

Not in our time, probably, and not by any of the means now employed to relieve the conditions of the poor. Giving money and charity indiscriminately only perpetuates and increases the evil. Those who find they can get along will be apt to slump down and be supported by alms, if they can. Neither will poverty be relieved through creating artificial demands for labor by searching around to make work where none would naturally be needed. In the monarchical countries, when poverty presses and bread riots, insurrections and revolutions threaten, it has been the custom to borrow money and open a set of public works, on roads or elsewhere, to keep the common people's stomachs filled and their hands occupied so they will not think too much. But all these artificial remedies have after a time failed. The earthquake has always come sooner or later. Poverty can never be abolished until it is done by the poor themselves. They themselves must find the cause of their ills and its remedy. The poorer and hungrier they are the more likely they will be to set themselves thinking, though poverty and hunger are not for that reason to be encouraged, not at all. Most of the poverty of the present day, that not caused by the drunkenness and shiftlessness of the poverty-stricken themselves, arises from the unequal distribution of wealth. So long as one individual is permitted to own \$150,000,000 he undoubtedly has his own share of that of 2,000 other people, even giving each of them \$50,000 apiece. Still it would not be the proper thing to knock the one hundred and fifty times a millionaire down and take his wealth away from him. There are better ways of distributing the world's wealth. It is by cultivating the independence and general intelligence of those who produce the world's wealth. Opportunities lie all around us, but it is not until we have the means to take advantage of them that we are able to do so. Workingmen must unite for the creation of wealth and hold together as closely as they now do in their unions for resisting the encroachments of capital. The ideal state will be reached when labor and capitalist are combined in one. The great fortunes already made will be scattered in time. Let workingmen see to it that no more are hoarded up. Let them go in and divide the wealth of the future among themselves. A curious case of loss of one's own identity is recorded. A woman sitting quietly on the sea front at the British watering place of Brighton suddenly felt something break in her head. From that moment her past became a dead blank. She cannot recall so much as her own name. Indian War Veterans' Pensions.

Representative Hermann's bill pending the revision of Indian wars up to and including the year 1856 has been favorably reported to the house. The committee was unanimous in the vote. Mr. Hermann Tuesday made a complete showing as to the history and policy of the old war pensions and demonstrated that the time had now arrived when the service pension to these old men should no longer be delayed. The estimated age of the Oregon and Washington survivors is 67 years. Of the Oregon Indian war survivors but 136 and about 60 widows. There are not to exceed 4000 survivors of all the Indian wars of the nation extending to 1896. Under Mr. Hermann's bill there will be included the Rogue river, Yakima, Cayuse and other Indian wars of the Pacific Northwest, those of Texas and New Mexico of 1856-1859 and the Sabine disturbances of 1836. In the California and Utah wars there are few survivors to be included in the benefits of the bill.
