Wolcott's Monroe Doctrine Speech.

Members of the Denver Trades Assembly denounced Senator Wolcott in severe words at their regular session because of his attack upon the Monroe doctrine, and resolutions of scorn, censure and a request for his resignation were offered, but failed to receive votes enough to be passed. Some wanted to hang him in effigy, others to give him a drubbing with clubs upon his next visit to Colorado. He was called a Judas and a Benedict Arnold, and one member wanted the records of the assembly revised so that his name might be expunged wherever it appeared. The assembly passed resolutions complimentary to Senator Tillman.

Richer Than Cripple Creek.

Reports come from Anaconda, Mont., of new gold discoveries on Flint creek, 20 miles from that city. L. U. Loomis, a well-known mining man who is acquainted with Cripple Creek, declares that Flint creek is a richer gold district than the former. Sam Snyder located the "Hungry Prospector" group of mines, and Loomis says he has the perfect mine in his claims. The new strike is not far from the famous Cable gold mine which during the last few years has yielded over \$3,000,000.

To Irrigate Arid Lands.

Representative Hartman of Montana has introduced a bill granting to California, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, North and South Dakota all the arid lands within their borders. Any land requiring artificial irrigation to produce agricultural crops is to be deemed "arid" or "desert" land, and the proceeds of the sale of any such land by each of said states is to be used only for the reclamation of other desert lands within the limits of such state.

To Reform the Government.

About 50 young men of San Jose have effected a political organization, to be known as the League of Californians. Its object is to aid in securing good government in state, county and local affairs. The league will meet weekly. Following are the officers elected for the ensuing year: President, John W. Sullivan; vice president, A. E. Underwood; secretary, John A. Anthes; treasurer, O. D. Dewey; marshal, R. S. Kooser.

John Hays Hammond has been released from the Pretoria jail on bail.

Mme. Modjeska, who has been very ill, has resumed her professional engagements at Chicago.

Dr. Edward McMillen, the famous priest and orator is lecturing on single "x" in the South. Cardinal Sattoli has sanctioned the doctor's teachings.

Colonel William P. Thompson, the well known financier and tycoon of New York, died recently of pneumonia. His fortune is estimated at from \$5,000,000 to 10,000,000.

Hon. William H. English died at Indianapolis after an illness of two weeks. He was the nominee for vice president in 1880 on the ticket with General Hancock.

Ex-President Harrison has written an open letter in which he declares he does not want his name presented to the St. Louis convention. He says that since he left the White House he has had no wish to return to it.

Mrs. Leland Stanford has returned to San Francisco after an absence in the East of over four months. She came directly from Washington after the close of the argument in the supreme court on her case with the government.

Ironwood (Mich.) has a Russian count at work shoveling snow off the streets. His name is Count Polinski and he claims to be a Russian nobleman who was obliged to leave his country to escape punishment for conspiracy against the government. The count was arrested for vagrancy and sentenced to 30 days imprisonment.

The Woodward & Shanklin horse sale at Lexington, Ky., showed low prices for trotting horses. On the first day 74 head were sold for \$12,545, an average per head of \$167. The second day 74 head brought \$13,085, averaging \$174 apiece. On the third day 89 horses realized \$10,085, averaging \$114, and the fourth day's sale amounted to 73 head for \$7,650, an average of \$104.

The suit of the San Francisco Savings Union against the Semi-Tropic Land and Water company of San Bernardino to foreclose a mortgage for \$750,000 has been decided in favor of the plaintiff. The original suit involved the homes of 450 persons. Some of these have paid off their portion of the mortgage while others have abandoned their property in despair.

The youngest daughter of George Hazzard, a prominent Democratic politician and leader of the Hill Democracy in the West, has eloped with Edward Coates, aged 19, a clerk in the street railway office, from Tacoma. The girl is aged 16. Their parents supposed they were visiting friends in Seattle until it was learned that the couple left on a steamer for San Francisco, where they were arrested on a telegraphic warrant.

Percy G. Chamberlain, a retired captain of the British army, fatally shot himself with suicidal intent in Chicago. He left a singular letter in which he said that his only reason for suicide was that he was tired of the world. "I want no fancy funeral," he wrote. "The potter's field will make a downy couch to rest my bones in. Let me be buried with the burial of an ass, a stranger in a strange land, unknown and unknown."

The house became involved a few days ago in a bitter controversy. It sprang from remarks made by Talbot (Democrat) of South Carolina in defense of secession, which Bartlett (Republican) of Massachusetts interpreted as treasonable. He had Talbot's words taken down and offered a resolution of censure. Robinson, son of the manager of the show, fired a round when within 25 feet of the animal. This so enraged the brute that it leaped upon Robinson and his long claws lacerated his head and body and sank its teeth into his scalp. The leopard was finally beaten off and killed with a charge of buckshot. It was valued at \$2,000. Young Robinson's condition is serious.

Pearl Bryan's Murderers.

Scott Jackson and Alonzo M. Walling of Jacksonville, Ind., are charged with the murder of Pearl Bryan. The crime was committed near Cincinnati. All the people involved are young and of good families. William Woods, a minister's son, is also implicated. The girl was in a delicate condition and she went to Cincinnati, where Walling, who is a dental student, performed a criminal operation on her. She died and to hide the crime the body was deposited in a coffin and taken to Young Woods put the girl on a train to send her to Cincinnati. It is not known which youth was responsible for the girl's condition.

Did Her Father and Brother.

Miss Lillie Lewis of Spokane is of a romantic disposition and she planned and helped to execute her own abduction. She was assisted by two men, one of whom was her lover, who handled her father and brother rather roughly. The men drove up to her father's house in a hack and when the father responded to a knock on the door he was laid out by a blow from the club. The men seized the girl and rushed to the back. Her brother attempted to rescue her and was knocked down by a rock. The police searched all night for the abductors, but they did not find them. The next day the love-sick maiden returned home for her clothing and confessed that she planned the abduction and that she was going to marry one of the men.

Our Murder Story.

Judge Parker, in his charge to the jurors in empaneling them for the February term of the United States court at Fort Smith, Ark., quoted statistics showing that the average number murdered in the United States in the last five years was greater than the entire Continental army to which Washington bid farewell. The last year the number murdered, he said, was in excess of the standing army at the beginning of the Civil war. For these murders one out of 60 were legally punished.

No trace has yet been found of Mrs. A. B. Coyle, who disappeared from Tacoma last week.

William E. Wheelock & Co., piano manufacturers at New York, have failed.

The Truckee ice palace has been rebuilt and large crowds are again enjoying the winter sports.

The new building of the Native Sons of the Golden West at San Francisco was a fittingly dedicated last Sunday.

John J. Horvick, aged 27, formerly a railroad employee, was killed while attempting to board a moving train near Yreka, Cal.

The steamer Columbia struck her rudder while crossing the bar at Astoria, Ore., and had to be towed back to Portland.

The senatorial deadlock in Kentucky is apparently as far from solution as ever. Both Hunter and Blackburn are confident of victory.

Perry Allen of Washington, private secretary of Justice Harlan, has been appointed assistant secretary to the Venezuelan commission.

Emma Perkins, aged 18, the beautiful daughter of a prominent contractor at Seattle, was found in a Chinese opium den smoking "dope" with a Chinaman.

Frank Speicher, an express agent at Dunbridge, Ohio, was short in his cash and he was short in his accounts with a stove pot, claiming he was robbed by footpads.

Hillary Butler, for 45 years a resident of Seattle and one of the founders of the city, died recently. He was a native of Virginia, aged 76 years. Butler did much for the state of Washington and in politics was a Democrat.

The board of supervisors of San Benito county have demanded the resignation of County Treasurer Montgomery. He was short in his accounts a year ago and the amount was made up by a relative and he continued in office.

Hon. Thomas F. Bayard, United States ambassador to England has authorized President Cleveland to announce his resignation in the event congress passes a resolution censuring him for utterances in his speeches in Great Britain.

General John Gilboa died at Baltimore a few days ago. He made a gallant record in the war and on the frontier. He entered the army in 1847, at the age of 20, and served until retired in 1881. He was the commander of the Army of the Potomac.

Mary Agnes Bennett, a young girl at Alameda, Cal., attempted to poison her grandparents and her aunt by putting "rough on rats" in their tea. This intended victim drank the poison and narrowly escaped death. The girl will not tell her motive in trying to get rid of her relatives.

P. H. Foster, who dealt in green and dried fruits under the firm name of Foster & Co. at San Jose for the past two years, is anxiously wanted by creditors. Ten days ago Foster and his family, after selling their household effects, left San Jose and are now supposed to be in Honolulu.

Custer and His Sister.

William Custer, a relative of General George A. Custer who was killed by Indians in the Little Big Horn massacre, has received a letter from Kansas City from his sister, Amanda Custer, of Slocum, Pa., whom he had not heard from for 21 years. In 1874 William was a member of a volunteer company at Wicksburg, Pa., raised to put down the "Molly Maguires." After they were dispersed he feared death at their hands and secretly left the state. Since then, until receiving his sister's letter, he has been unable to trace his relatives. Custer was a victim of highway robbery at Kansas City recently and publication of the affair enabled his sister to write to him.

Some business men have quadrupled their last year's subscriptions.

The Cheese-Making Business.

At the session of the Wisconsin Agricultural society W. A. Henry, dean of the college of agriculture at the state university in Madison, gave an address on the necessity of legislation for protection of the cheese-making industry. He cited the fact that in 1880 the United States exported cheese to the value of \$12,170,000, and in 1894 amounting to \$1,180,000, a decrease of 40 per cent. While Canada exported in 1880 cheese to the value of \$3,900,000, and in 1894 amounting to \$15,500,000, an increase of nearly 400 per cent.

They Want Booth to Stay.

A meeting to protest against the removal of the Booth from the leadership of the Salvation Army in this country filled the main floor of Carnegie Music hall, New York, full of friends of the deceased leaders. Chas. M. Dewey, president and ministers of almost every denomination were present. Resolutions were adopted urging, if consistent with the best interests of the Salvation Army throughout the world, that Commander and Mrs. Booth be allowed to remain in the positions in which they have been so abundantly blessed by God; in which they have won the honor, gratitude and love of the American people and have led on with inspiring zeal all the members of the army in their rescue work.

John Costello, who shot and killed James Langhran in a drunken row at Lodi, Cal., has been held for murder.

John Lee, an engineer, and Alexander Gordon, a fireman, were killed by an explosion of dynamite at South Lawrence, Mass.

A house in course of construction at Oakland collapsed and Charles Hanley was killed. Half a dozen carpenters were severely injured.

The trial of Kelsey Porter, charged with the murder of three members of the Macho family in Pine valley on New Year's day, has begun at Union, Ore.

The schooner Florida was blown ashore on Salisbury Beach, Mass., and the crew were drowned. The crew consisted of a captain and seven men.

Nine poker players were arrested at San Francisco last Saturday night. The police are determined to enforce the ordinance against open gambling saloons.

J. W. Hall, when alighting from a train at Redding, Cal., stepped into an open manhole, was thrown from his feet and rolled under the train. One leg was injured and had to be amputated.

Prince Reed, deacon of a colored church at Louisville, was shot and fatally wounded by John Breckinridge, a ruffian whom the deacon tried to eject from the church for disturbing the services.

The regular Union Pacific, Denver and Gulf mail train from Denver was blown from the track at Fisher Gulch, Colo., by a terrific wind and was completely wrecked, but fortunately no one was seriously injured.

Harry Meyer of Oakland has been arrested on complaint of his father for stealing a diamond stud valued at \$190.

Meyer, who is 28 years old, met his father on the street and snatched the diamond from his shirt front and ran off.

Mary McDermott, a member of the Morton street, San Francisco, demi monde, was strangled to death in her room. Her body was found by the rent collector. The woman was young and the only daughter of a well-to-do widow, but she chose a life of shame.

Mrs. H. H. Button of Bellevue, Sonoma county, Cal., threw herself from the top of a train and instantly killed. She was 36 years old and the mother of three children. Her husband is the well-known horseman, "Doc" Button. She recently applied for a divorce.

Recent developments have shown that the Sellers, who were lynched at Knoxville, Tenn., ten years ago for supposed murder and robbery, was innocent. Lizzie Hickman on her deathbed confessed that Ike Wright, a notorious character, was the murderer. Officers are now after him.

William Kinney, believed to be a dangerous criminal and held to await the grand jury's action on a charge of forgery, broke jail at Phoenix, A. T. He escaped through the iron ceiling of his cell and escaped to the roof through the ventilator, whose protecting bars it was found were made of tin. The jail is new and cost \$15,000.

William Morris and H. P. Hawkins, private detectives who were securing evidence to convict saloon men at San Jose of selling liquor to minors, have been charged with inducing Paddy Olinsted, a 13-year-old boy, to enter saloons and purge intoxicating liquors. At the preliminary examination the men pleaded not guilty and will be tried by jury.

An extensive ice gorge in the Platte river at Clarke, Neb., has caused a dangerous overflow. The bottom lands under water for miles. A number of farmers who occupy an island in the river are threatened, with their families. The river is higher than ever known and so full of ice that no boat can be floated. Much stock has perished, but so far no lives are known to have been lost.

A storm swept along the Atlantic coast last week, destroying much property. Bomb Brook, N. J., was the scene of a terrible disaster. Many lives were lost. The Raritan river overflowed in the night and ran through the streets of the town, undermining the houses and causing them to collapse. To add to the horror many buildings caught fire and nothing could be done to stop the flames. Casualties are reported from many places.

The piano store of F. R. Girard at Oakland was entered by cracksmen who secured \$400 in gold and about \$800 worth of jewelry and diamonds which had been left in the safe by Mrs. Girard. The safe was wrecked by dynamite and the wholesale wrecking of the piano store, the loss of the proprietor up to \$5,000. Five pianos were ruined and two of them were reduced to fragments by the force of the explosion.
