Change in Voting.

The last legislature made a change in the matter of marking ballots. The voter does not have to cross out the names which he does not want to vote for. A simple cross on the left of a candidate's name denotes his choice. The following is the law on the subject: "On the receipt of the will ballot as furnished the elector shall forthwith, and without leaving the enclosed space, return alone to one of the compartments provided, and then shall prepare his ballot by marking immediately to the left of the candidate of his choice for each office by a cross or by writing in the name of the person he wishes to vote for."

Miss Frankie Brewer, daughter of Associate Justice Brewer of the United States Supreme Court, died at San Antonio, Tex., of consumption.

A duel over a woman at a small town in western Florida has caused the business of the grave diggers to brisk up. Four men were killed outright and three others seriously injured.

William Durko, an escaped prisoner, was shot and killed at Merced by Officer Collins while fleeing. Durko ran and fired at the constable, who returned the fire, killing the man.

The track team of the Stanford University will take part in the games of the Western Athletic Association of Chicago this spring.

Farmers at Goose Lake, Cal., report a vast amount of damage being done to the grain fields by the blue cranes. Boys and men are engaged in herding the birds away from the crops.

Twenty-three of the principal strawberry growers of Humboldt county, Cal., have formed a permanent organization, representing fifty acres of bearing strawberry vines, which, it is estimated, will produce 300,000 pounds of fruit, valued at \$10,000.

The Sebastopol cannery will be operated this year on a larger scale than ever before, and from 250 to 300 hands will be employed during the entire season.

The late frost have done much damage all through Santa Barbara county. Fruit has suffered most. Apricots will scarcely be a quarter of a crop. Peaches are not damaged so badly. Apples are not as much injured as was thought.

Senator John Beard of Alameda county ten years ago planted an acre in locust trees. Last season he sold all the trees, measuring six inches in diameter to a sea captain for ship timber, and made \$648 by the transaction, besides cutting thirty cords of wood for use.

Professor J. R. Wetherbee of the University of Oregon, in gathering a collection of snakes and toads for that institution, has received a five-legged toad. The extra leg is joined to the left shoulder just in front of the fore leg. It is perfectly formed.

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POLITICAL POINTERS.

President Cleveland, according to the statement of the Postmaster of Chicago, will not accept another nomination. He says he could not survive another four years of the nervous strain.

Rev. E. L. Eaton of Racine is talked of for Governor by Prohibition delegates to the Wisconsin State Convention.

The Democrats of Douglas county, Ill., have passed a resolution favoring William R. Morrison for President and the restoration of silver to where it was before its demonetization in 1873.

Up to date seventy-eight out of ninety-nine counties in Iowa have held Democratic conventions. The free-silver men have elected 512 delegates only being doubtful.

The California Prohibition party has nominated Senator J. E. McComas of Pomona for Lieutenant Governor and Samuel Chumney M. Dunn of Sacramento for Congress—First district.

The two houses of Louisiana in joint session declared that the entire Democratic ticket, headed by A. J. Forrester for Governor, is elected.

The People's party convention at Sacramento made the following nominations: For Senator of the United States, Thomas V. Cator of San Francisco; For Lieutenant Governor—J. L. Gilbert of Fresno. General Weaver of Iowa is in Oregon in the interests of the People's party.

The New York Democratic State Central Committee decided to hold the state convention to select delegates at large to the Chicago Convention at Saratoga, June 24th.
