THE FIRST GAME OF FOOT BALL. The Second Normal Team Defeated the High School 6 to 4.

Last Saturday the second team of the Southern Oregon State Normal School and the Ashland high school team played, at the grounds near the depot, the first game of the season, in this part of the state.

The game resulted in a victory for the normals, the score standing 6 to 4. Excepting that the ground was very slippery everything else was favorable. There were about 200 persons that witnessed the contest and a great deal of enthusiasm was evinced on both sides.

The line-up of the teams is as follows: NORMAL POSITION: HIGH SCHOOL. Sidney Foster... Arch Sackett... Fred Weston... Leo Hopkins... Blaine Klum... Chester Eyster... L. T. Dewey... Ed Miller... John Mcintosh... Roy Neil.

The officers were: umpire, Prof. Washburn, referee, H. B. Holbert, linesmen, Prof. J. H. Berry and A. C. Dixon. The game was called shortly after 2 o'clock, the normals taking the north goal, the high school team the south goal and the net being the high school team.

The ball was now taken to the center of the field for the second kick-off. Here followed some hot skirmishing the ground being closely contested.

At the half the high school team was successful in making a touch-down, but failed to kick a goal. Score 6 to 4 in favor of the normals. The ball was again taken to the center of the field, the normals having the ball and the game being again successful in making a touch-down.

It was during the ten minutes rest which followed that Capt. Barnes was taken off the field by the ambulance, and excitement was too much for him. For a time he was completely out of his head and called signals which kept him playing hard all of the time.

When time was called at the beginning of the second half the teams changed goals the normals having the kick-off. This was the most exciting part of the game. Both teams got down to business from the start, each trying to raise their score.

This is the closest game ever played in Ashland, and we may attribute the same to the good coaching of Prof. Washburn, and the determination with which each team went into the game.

The game passed off with good feeling on the part of the contestants.
