Klamath Commissioners Return.
San Francisco, Dec. 9.—The Klamath
commissioners returned here today.
Major R. P. Hammond, Captain Ivan
Applegate and William P. Coleman,
special commissioners appointed by
President Cleveland to visit the Klamath
and Modoc Indian reservation, re-
turned to this city today.

The commissioners left here Oct. 16,
and, after leaving the railroad, they
traveled 500 miles in wagons, escorted
by Indians.
All the gentlemen are most enthu-
siastic over their trip and over the possi-
bilities of the mountainous country
which they visited.

They were greeted by Jesse Kirk Kel-
logg, a noted chief, who made an excel-
lent and patriotic speech.
Indian couriers rode 300 miles to wire
President Cleveland messages regarding
the arrival of the commissioners.
The Indians claim 100,000 acres of land
in their reservation, and ask indemnities
for intrusions of their territory in 1864.
The commissioners will make an ex-
haustive report regarding the claims of
the Indians and the boundaries of the
territory under consideration.
