The court offered him \$1.50, which was all he had offered to pay his men. The assessor employed lawyers, but they could find no law. Their wealth and intelligence preclude the idea that their extraordinary diet should have been adopted for either economy or imperfect investigation into matters of science. They moved from England to the South Sea Islands, where Mr. Beal was a representative of his majesty's royal government. When Mr. Beal died they came to California, and have been living in a very pretty little place which nestles among the Berkeley hills.
