There are two methods of paying sugar bounties, the direct and indirect. The direct way, instituted first by France, consists in the government pay-ing a specified sum to the owners of all home grown sugar that can be exported. France and Germany are the chief conntries at present paying the direct bounty, which amounts legally on the average to about three-tenths of a cent a pound. The beet sugar industry is heavily taxed in both Germany and in France, and in each country laws have been passed remitting under certain condi-

In indirect sugar bounties France pays annually \$10,502,771; Germany, \$4,237,058; Austria, \$3,641,000. In order to get as much of the direc bounty as possible the sugar exporter sells to the foreign buyer at a very low price, sometimes below what the con sumer at home is forced to pay. So great a rivalry in sugar production is now on between the countries of continenta Europe that it must result disastrously


