The Populist Congressman Speaks In the People's Church on "the Fourth." On invitation Congressman Jerry Simpson and Senator Alien made addresses in the People's church in Washington on the morning of July 4 Following is what Mr. Simpson said in

"I doubt if half a dozen men at the time who took an interest in the affair really understood the full import of the Declaration of Independence. Jefferson anderstood it and laid it down as a cardinal principle. What little success we have achieved lies in the fact that Jefferson realized and incorporated therein equality of opportunity. Equality of opportunity for all is Jeffersonian

"I hold that today the struggle for existence and the conditions of life are harder than in the days of Jefferson, and that we do not receive the full benefit of our government. What are the causes? We see the land taken up and controlled by syndicates. We ought to devote more attention to pleading the cause of the miners of the state of Illinois and should manifest an interest in the conditions under which they strugevery laboring man in the United States We say that ought not to be in so grand a land, with all its resources and the inventive genius of labor to create machinery. Yet these are the conditions confronting us today. We are on the verge of a revolution—a political one perhaps, a peaceful one perhaps. I do not believe that people who listen to annual Fourth of July orations will sit down quietly and submit to those con-ditions. It is the duty of every statesman to proclaim and point out when he gets an opportunity the evil he sees, however much he may by so doing hurt the prejudices of these fine haired states-

"One of the great evils is the power of accumulated wealth. If you would use your common sense and mother wit for just a moment, you would know that many of the men in congress are only developed in the faculties of gain-ing wealth. LIFE IN GREAT CITIES.

Is Less Engrating Than That is of great cities to enervate nations, there is no proof of it at all, unless we identithe life of great cities with the possion for idleness and pleasure and self-indulgence which sometimes, but by no means universally, accompanies their growth, says the London Spec-tator. When you get a large proletari-at, living, as that of ancient Rome and possibly of Nineveh and Babylon did, on the alms of the rich and powerful, then no doubt you have the conditions of a thoroughly unnatual and unhea!thy life, and no one can wonder at the rapid decay of such cities and of the nations which gloried in them. But where the honest working class far out-number the proletariat, where the middle classes of distributors and manufacturers and professional men are la borious and energetic, and even ciass that lives on its accumulated wealth contains a considerable sprinkling of serious and disinterested work-ers, we do not believe that there is the smallest evidence of any greater danger in the life of the agricultural village or the pastoral tribe. Indeed, we should regard Olive Schreiner's picture of the life of the modern Boers as indicating a condition of things more prolific of morbid elements, with its almost com plete absence of any stirring or active intelligence, than any kind of modern life that is honestly laborious at all. The Boer life is too sleepy, too destitute of stirring thought or effort, to be altogether natural. It needs at least the old element of danger and neces-sary vigilance to render it even bracing.

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
