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NEW STATE MINING LAWS.

Important Changes Made in the Mining Laws of Oregon.

A bill for an act relating to mining claims and repealing chapter XIII of the code of civil and criminal procedure in justice's courts, and sections 3827, 3828, 3829, 3830, 3831, 3832, 3833, 3834 and 3835 of chapter LX, Hill's Annotated Laws of Oregon.

It is enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. Any person, a citizen of the United States, or any one who has discovered a vein or lode of mineral rock in place upon the unappropriated public domain of the United States within this state, may locate a claim upon such vein or lode so discovered by posting thereon a notice of such discovery, projecting not less than three feet above the surface of the ground, and not less than four inches square in diameter, and containing the name of the locator and the date of the discovery, and the location of the vein or lode, and the general course or strike of the vein or lode as nearly as may be, and by defining the boundaries upon the surface of such claim, and the same shall be readily traced; such boundaries shall be marked within three days after posting of such notice by six substantial posts, projecting not less than three feet above the surface of the ground, and not less than four inches square in diameter, and containing the name of the locator and the date of the discovery, and the location of the vein or lode, and the general course or strike of the vein or lode as nearly as may be, and by defining the boundaries upon the surface of such claim, and the same shall be readily traced; 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
