Longing Contract Finished.
David Horn has finished the cutting contract of 17,000,000 feet of logs for Lindley, Mason & Co. Work on the new chute to send the logs into Klamath river at Heswick via the railroad, the old chute having worn out, has commenced. It will require about six weeks to rebuild it, after which the remaining logs of Mr. Horn's contract will be put in the river and run down to the mill at Klamath. Lindley, Mason & Co. are now hiring men and doing their own logging. They traded section 13 to Congressman Hopkins for section 20, and have their new camp established there. On it is two miles from Snow and the camp is called Pokegama. A. B. Smith has resigned as postmaster at Snow and Mr. Iriah, a clerk in the company's store, is now acting as deputy, but will be appointed postmaster in time. A move is being made to start a school district at the camp for the children of the families there.

The question of permanent injunction asked for by Lindley, Mason & Co., against John R. Cook & Co., will be tried in the U. S. district court at San Francisco commencing Nov. 10th.

W. R. Ramsey Killed at Keno.

W. R. Ramsey, an old resident of Keno, died at 6 o'clock a. m. Saturday morning from the effects of a fatal accident that occurred to him 24 hours before. He was leaving his place Friday morning with a load of 2400 lbs. of wheat for the grist mill and accidentally dropped a line. Without locking the trunk on the wagon he stepped over the line and he fell on the top of the load. He missed his footing in some manner and fell to the ground between the horses. The wagon wheels dragged their way over his prostrate body lengthwise, breaking ten ribs in the right side of his body. The shocking accident occurred in the presence of his wife.

John Frulan is over from Davenport's copper mine and reports that the tunnel is now within about 35 feet of the ledge.

They did not develop their mine any, putting their time in erecting a residence and preparing matters to go to work early in the spring.

Repairing Telegraph Line.
W. H. Mowat, manager of the Postal Telegraph line in this city, owns the Ashland-Klamath Falls telegraph line which he bought from the government a number of years ago when the government telegraph line was maintained from Ashland to Ft. Klamath and on to Ft. Bidwell, Cal., at that time occupied by troops. Mr. Mowat kept the line in operation between here and Klamath Falls ever since for commercial business and for the past month has been engaged in making repairs for the winter between here and Keno, and from Keno to Klamath Falls he has built a new line. Next season the work of rebuilding the line from Ashland to Keno will be commenced. He has also established an office at R. A. Emmett's, now making seven offices connected with the system—Ashland, Soda Springs, Tyler's, Parker's, Keno, Emmett's and Klamath Falls. The line is a great convenience to Klamath county, an important section without a railroad or other telegraph or telephone communication.

Woodmen Holiday Excursion.

Trial of John Linn's Murderers.

A session occurred at Eugene this week in the trial of Claude Branton and Courtland Green, the two young men separately indicted for the murder of John Linn, when the latter pleaded guilty to the indictment of murder in the first degree. Sentence was set for next Monday. Branton pleaded not guilty. The state is awaiting a strong case about his neck and he will no doubt hang. The testimony of Green tells the horrible story of the murder. When he was put on the stand Branton cried like a child and wailed and moaned during the entire examination. It was a premeditated murder for the purpose of robbing Linn of a hand of horses they were engaged in driving. After Linn had gone to sleep Branton shot him twice. Branton and Green both placed his body on a fire and put wood on all night. In the morning they took the larger bones out of the fire, crushed them up on a flat rock with an axe, and threw them back in fire. The clothes and boot tops were also burned, the soles being thrown away. Branton robbed the corpse of \$75, a watch, a note, and all the valuables.

The French bark Duchess Anne

is in quarantine at San Francisco on account of bubonic plague among her crew. On the voyage from Hongkong the captain and a seaman died of the disease.

John Eaton, aged 75, and Mrs. Matilda Keifer, aged 70, were married recently at Baker City, Or.

The torpedo-boat destroyer Farragut on San Francisco bay last week, and during one of her spurs succeeded in covering a mile at a speed of 31.74 knots an hour. She was sent over the measured mile some half dozen times at different rates of speed, but managed to sustain an average of 30.14 knots.

Bids for extending the north and south jetties at Yaquina Bay, Wash., were opened by Major Flak at the United States Engineer's office in Portland. Chrisie, Lowe & Hayworth of Chicago were the lowest bidder, their bid being \$511,945. There were eight other bids ranging from \$609,000 to \$847,085. The bids will be forwarded to the war department, which will select the lowest responsible one.
