The Mexican named Rivera, arrested lately on Butte Creek mountain, this

lately on Butte Creek mountain, this county, for burglarizing a store of W. W. Smith, at Bly, near Klamath Falls, Or., and escaping from the Klamath Falls jail, besides stealing a horse to reach California, made his escape from the Yreka jail last Friday afternoon, between 5 and 6 o'clock, accompanied by the half-breed Indian named Brown, imprisoned for brutally beating his wife. Sheriff Freshour gave the two prisoners their supper about 5 p. m., and left them eating, to get his own supper. On returning about 6 o'clock, to lock them in their cell, he found his birds had flown, by having cut a hole through the brick by having cut a hole through the brick wall in rear, above one of the steel tanks, and then scaled the stone wall surrounding the jail. They evidently had everything ready from previous operations, requiring only a very few minutes' time in reaching freedom, and were not observed by any one outside, as they H. C. Reaching Hornbrook with his man, he turned him over to the Sheriff who brought him back to Yreka.


