Organization of a Company to Construct a Railroad from Klamath through the Jenny Creek Timber Belt to Klamath Falls and Navigate the Lakes and Rivers with Steamboats.

Conductor L. W. Van Horn of the Southern Pacific Co., Surveyor Jesse A. McCall, both of Ashland, David Horn of Hornbrook, Geo. T. Baldwin and Surveyor R. S. Moore of Klamath Falls on Saturday in Ashland, perfected the organization of the Oregon Midland Railway Company, with Klamath Falls its place of business and \$1,000,000 as the capital stock of the concern.

The purpose of the incorporation are the building of a railroad from Klamath through the Jenny Creek timber belt on through to Klamath Falls. The articles of incorporation allow them to navigate the lakes and rivers of the adjacent country.

Mr. Van Horn took Monday's train for Portland to engage the services of Engineer Eugene Schiller, who will immediately start out a force of 12 men to make the permanent survey of the railroad. A preliminary survey map was made of it this summer by W. O. Elliott, a surveyor of Portland.

The new company has an option of Congressman Hopkins tract of timber land, now consisting of 52,000 acres of timber land on Jenny creek, as well as a bonus from prominent land owners along the route.

Forest Rangers to Hang On. Salem, Nov. 1.—Captain S. B. Ormsby, superintendent of forest rangers, states that a large number of applications for appointment as forest rangers next year are already being received by him.

There will probably be no increase in the number of rangers next year. His state applications for positions will be useless, for the policy is to continue rangers at work so long as they give good service. The 44 rangers who were employed this year were furloughed early last month. Three supervisors were furloughed yesterday. Rangers are paid \$2 per day, while supervisors get \$5.
