Jacob Wagner, one of the highly respected citizens of Ashland, died at 1 o'clock this morning of neuritis of the heart at his home on Grant street.

Mrs. Wagner was native of Ohio, but spent considerable of his younger life in Iowa, coming from Louisa county in 1850, and settling on his farm in the vicinity of Wagner creek in 1852. After living there for ten years he moved to Ashland which he has since been the home of his family.

He was married to Mrs. E. A. Kinney and Miss Jessie Wagner. Mr. Wagner lived a useful and honored life, and his death is a serious loss.

The funeral takes place from residence tomorrow at 2 p. m. Rev. J. T. Abbott conducting the services, interment in Ashland cemetery.
