In almost every campaign Odonnel. something new or interesting turns up politically in Oregon. At the national capital the oldtimers in official life are always looking for something to happen out of the ordinary in Oregon politics. One of Oregon's first senathrs became a candidate for vice-president. Another Oregon senator, reputed the most eloquent orator in the land, resigned his seat to take command of a regiment, and was killed immediately afterward in the Ball's Bluff blunder. The great Tilden-Haves electoral contest was largely lought out over an Oregon vote. Oregon furn-ished a member of Grant's Cabinet, and a former senator, wbree ragged sense and rade wit gamed for him a national r-putation. Oregon's constitution prohibited the entrance into the state of negros or provision trains. mulattoes, and welcomed "the left win. of Price's army." After the war, Oregon elected several republican governors, and then-Pennover. Oregon has furnished several senatorial deadlocks, and twice has elected a senator at almost the last minute of the session. 
