Father Blanchet a Prelate. Portland Telegram. Right Rev. F. X. Blanchet, of this city, who is now traveling in Europe, has been named Monsignor by the Pope, thus being elevated to the rank of a prelate with all its accompanying privileges.

The Apostolic brief naming Rev. Blanchet Apostolic Prebendary, was received Monday from Rome by Archbishop Christie, through the Papal delegate, Mgr. Martineili.

This distinguished honor enrolls Father Blanchet among the members of the highest of all colleges of Roman prelates. It has been bestowed on him in recognition of his valuable services rendered to the Catholic Church of Oregon, during his career in the priesthood.

Direct Legislation Amendment. Some people want to know what the initiative and referendum means. The constitutional amendment that passed the referendum and it was explained to her and reads as follows:

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same hereby is proposed: Section 1 of article I of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

The legislative authority of the State shall be vested in a legislative assembly consisting of a Senate and House of Representatives, but the people reserve to themselves power to propose laws and amendments to the constitution, and to enact or reject the same at the polls, independent of the legislative assembly, and also reserve power to initiate bills upon subjects other than those reserved to the legislative assembly. The first power reserved by the people is the initiative, and the second is the referendum. Any measure proposed by the people shall be filed with the Secretary of State not less than four months before election at which they are to be voted upon. The second power reserved by the people is the referendum, and any measure proposed by the people shall be filed with the Secretary of State not more than ninety days before election at which they are to be voted upon. The referendum shall not extend to measures referred to the people. All elections on measures referred to the people of the state shall be had at the biennial regular general elections, except when the legislative assembly shall refer to the people the last when it is approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon, and not otherwise. The vote of all bills shall be taken at the polls by the people of the State of Oregon. This section shall not be construed to deprive any member of the legislative assembly of the right to introduce any measure. The whole number of votes cast for Justice of the Supreme Court at the regular election last preceding the filing of any petition for the initiative or for the referendum shall be the basis on which the number of legal voters necessary to sign such petition shall be counted. Petitions and order for the initiative or for the referendum shall be filed with the Secretary of State, and in submitting the same to the people he and other officers shall be guided by the general laws and the act submitting this amendment, until legislation shall be especially provided for.

Adopted by the House January 27, 1899.

Thos. Kay Dies. Thos. Kay, in former years superintendent of the Ashland Woolen Mills, out of late years at Salem, died at St. Vincent's hospital at Portland, Friday, leaving a wife and five children. The funeral took place at Salem. The Oregonian editorially speaks of his death:

In the removal of Thomas Kay, of Salem, death called away a most valuable citizen. The scope of his activities covered various parts of western Oregon, but was always confined to the occupational industry of which he had expert knowledge—the manufacture of woolen goods. For nearly thirty years he was an important figure in recent years the most important, with one exception—in the development of our local woolen manufacturing industry, the towns of Brownsville, Dallas, Ashland, Waterloo and Salem having experienced the benefits of his practical knowledge and keen-sighted enterprise. It appears to be a fact that, while mills in various places languished and finally failed for want of trained oversight and competent direction, the Kay mills were unformally successful. His death is, therefore, a real loss to the state.
