MINING ITEMS.

The Preston Peak copper district in the Siskiyou mountains is developing into prominence.

Schoonover & Young, the New York capitalists represented by Henry Phillips, have spent \$100,000 getting their properties developed. The work is a 200 foot drift right on ledge and a 70 foot winze. The rock is very hard. The true fissure vein is six feet. They have 175 tons of ore piled up and it assays 22 per cent copper, \$4 in gold and a trace of sulphur. They have had a force of 20 to 25 men at work all winter and last summer. Surveyor H. W. Scheld of Yreka has surveyed a road out which will necessitate the building of 50 miles of wagon road.

The other property is owned by E. M. Drexler and John W. Pierson of San Francisco, who are represented by J. T. DeBoy. They have expended \$65,000 in development work in the past eleven months and have a force of 12 men. Their vein is four feet and runs parallel with the other property and assays the same. Their work consists of an 80 foot drift with a 75 foot shaft and three levels amounting to 300 feet.

R. W. Kennedy is treating 400 tons of tailings at his quartz mill on Applegate. Their work consists of an 80 foot drift with a 75 foot shaft and three levels amounting to 300 feet.

Yreka Journal: A Pittsburg, Penn., Co. has paid up the amount of bond held on the Sterling mine in Cottonwood district near Oregon, and has also bonded the Pool quartz mine in same locality for \$25,000. The Sterling mine has paid well during the prospecting period. The bond under the supervision and tendence of S. J. Fore, hence the purchase of the Pool mine, with probability of buying the Hill mine, which is the most extensive ledge in the county, and pays well as far as prospect.

Coburn of Yreka, Cal., has filed an application for a patent in three quartz mining claims, under the name of the "Hobson group of mines," situated in Preston Peak mining district, and consisting of the Copper Bell, the Hobson and the Success mining claims.
