New Enterprise in Southern Oregon.

he found the mining industry enjoying stable. unprecedented boom. A San Francisco company has just purchased 300 acres of land within three miles of Gold Hill, and has put in a demonstration plant which is to test the efficiency of their dry washing process for working the county thereabout. Another San-Franscisco concern, the John L. Farris Company, has secured 600 acres of land for dredging purposes, and will at once begin to place dredges in ponds dug for them. It is the intention of both companies to spend a great deal of money, and to push the work of development development actively.

California capitalists have become interested in an irrigation scheme, the purpose of which is to dig a canal 50 miles long which will irrigate thousands of acres of land in the vicinity of Med-es without a dairy meeting somewhere.

The High Line Ditch Company, in which Mrs. Dekum, of Portland, is heavily interested, has now completed the survey, and will soon begin the work of construction. The canal will be 194 miles ong, 14 feet wide at the top and 8 feet wide at the bottom, and 6 feet deep. It is the intention to use it chiefly to supply water to mines, and its completion will solve a problem that alone has retarded development of the mines of that district. The water will come from the Rogue River, and the supply will be in-


