#### FATAL SHOOTING ACCIDENT.

Louis Jacks of Ashland accidentally kills Clarence Hughes at Hornbrook.

A sad and distressing accident occurred at Hornbrook Tuesday morning about 11 o'clock by which a 15-year-old boy named Clarence Hughes, son of Chas. Hughes, foreman of the round house at Hornbrook, lost his life by the accidental discharge of a 22-caliber revolver in the hands of Louis Jacks of Ashland, a young man about 20 years of age and son of W. H. Jacks, an old resident of this county. Jacks was canvassing for views for the Keystone View Co. in that section with his brother, Will Jacks. At the time of the accident he and another boy, Will Day, son of Constable W. G. Day, were engaged in shooting at a mark with the Day boy's pistol in the neighborhood of Day's restaurant. Young Jacks had been and ceased and was talking to a friend, but forgot that his revolver was cocked and as the Hughes boy was coming up by his side the revolver accidentally discharged, the ball entering his side and going right through the body, cutting the liver and intestines and lodging under the skin on the opposite side. Dr. West and two other physicians operated on him but he passed away at 11 o'clock the same night. Rev. O. Meares of the Catholic church at Yreka, was at the bedside of the deceased.

The boy was a fine child well-liked by all and the idol of the bosom of his parents and relatives. The mother is a sister of Mrs. J. W. Lauchlan and Engineer F. H. McDonald of Ashland. Mrs. Lauchlan was visiting at the Hughes home at the time of the distressing affair and Mr. Lauchlan and Engineer McDonald were immediately summoned.

The funeral will be held at Hornbrook at 3 o'clock this afternoon, Father O'Meara officiating. The bereaved family and relatives have the sympathy of the community in their great affliction.
