Accused of a Terrible Crime. SAN JOSE, January 4 .- The destruction of Conrad Ruff's home by fire two weeks ago and the burning to death of as four young children had a sensational sequel today, when Mrs. Sallie Ruff, who is Ruff's second wife and was the stepmother of the children, was arrested on charges of arson and murder. The warrants were sworn to by Carl Ruff, brother of Conrad Ruff, nd charge Mrs. Ruff with the burning of her own home and the willful murder of her husband's four children-Carl, Kate, Barbara and Conrad Jr. A good deal of circumstantial evidence is out forward in support of the allegaions that the children were drugged

and the house then set on fire. SAN JOSE, January 5.-The mystery that surrounds the burning of the Ruff home and the four children increases with each development. This morning, Mrs. Sadie Ruff, who yesterday was arrested for the crime of arson, was arraigned before Justice Rosenthal. The investigation pursued by the sheriff, district attorney and justice since her arrest convinced them that a terrible crime had been committed by some one, out each development pointed less strongly to Mrs. Ruff as the guilty person. They determined, however, to held her, and also to secure all whom there was any possibility of having

been implicated in it. Accordingly, Mrs. Ruff was turned over to the coustedy of her attorney, there being no accommodations for herself and baby in the jail, and warrants were issued for the arrest of Conrad Ruff, her husband, the three brothers, Carl, Ludwig and Jonas, and the hired man, William Valdez. They are all charged with the crime of arsen. All were arrested, arraigned and their bail set at \$5000 each, which has been secured by Carl and Jonas Ruff.
