The snowfail was the heaviest ever known here. Timber it took hard work to save the buildings. In spite of all that could be done many build ings were broken down Luckily they were all barns and stock sheds, no dwellings as yet heard of. The details of the damage will be given next week when we can more fully and carefully ascertain how much damage has been done. We still have about 10 mehes of snow with us yet with as good chance for more as we have for less We receive a few showers of the downy fleece every day.
