The assembly committee appointed to investigate the charges against the police department of San Francisco and the administration of the state's laws in its report. The committee finds that the laws against gambling in Chinatown have been violated, and recommends that the mayor, police commissioners and chief of police proceed forthwith to enforce the laws of the state of California. The subject will be considered by the assembly this week.

The San Joaquin river broke through the levee of the Bell-Fabian tract, on Union Island. Seven thousand acres were inundated, all of which were under thorough cultivation. It will probably cost \$75,000 to reclaim the land.

The house recently passed the army appropriation bill and entered upon consideration of the sundry civil bill, the last but one of the big money bills. The debate on the army bill was confined largely to a discussion of the question of passing bills to remove the charge of desertion against soldiers and was made, notably by a statement of McClellan of New York, comparing the cost of the soldier in European armies with the cost in the United States. According to his figures, including the cost of pensions, each United States soldier involved an annual expense of \$288, while a German soldier cost \$227 and a French soldier \$239.

The Boers Defeated by the British at the Tlokoeng. In a dispatch from Middleburg dated Feb. 24 Lord Kitchener says that French reports from Piet Retief, Feb. 23, that the result of the column's sweeping attack on the Boers was retreating in scattered and disorganized parties to a number of some 5000 in front of him. Amsterdam and Piet Retief have been occupied by the British. Summarizing the losses inflicted upon the enemy up to Feb. 19 1899 Boers are known to have been killed and wounded in action, 50 taken prisoners and 182 surrendered. Large quantities of arms and ammunition, horses, mules, etc., were captured. The British casualties were five officers and 40 men killed and four officers and 18 men wounded. Among the killed was Major Howard of the Canadian Scouts.

Plumer reports the capture of DeWet's 1500-pounder and pom-pom Feb. 23, as well as 58 prisoners, the Boers being in full retreat.

Mr. Story advised the Boers to shift for themselves and to return to the Orange River Colony as best they could. He and Dewet took 800 of the best horses with which to escape.

The Boers on Feb. 18th derailed a train containing General Kitchener's baggage, which fell into their hands. The train was proceeded by another in which the commander-in-chief was a passenger. They also destroyed a cable between Natal spruit and Killybeg, and the cable between Killybeg and Johannesburg Feb. 20th. They captured a trainload of foodstuffs, and, after taking all they could conveniently carry, set fire to the rest and disappeared over the veldt.

The arrival of Coghlan's boat at Meigs wharf at 7:40 o'clock in the morning was the first intimation received of the disaster that had befallen the shipwrecked people were rescued to the wharf, and the Merchants' Exchange and barge office people did all in their power to aid to their comfort. Hacks and patrol wagons were summoned, and by degrees the change of quarters more comfortable quarters up town. There were 19 men and 20 women and children, to whom Quartermaster Lundstrom, to whose efforts many of them owed their lives. The most prominent passenger on the vessel was Rounsaville Wildman, United States consul-general at Hongkong. He, with wife and two children, perished, possibly in the first mate's boat, which is supposed to have been smashed by the wreckage when the ship langed to the bottom. Wildman was returning to this country on a leave of absence.
