Sir Alfred Milner, British high commissioner in South Africa, has arrived in London, and it is announced that King Edward has elevated him to the peerage as Lord Milner of Cape Town.  
The wooden steamer Baltimore founded in Lake Huron, near Antrim, and 12 of her crew of 14 were drowned. Thomas Murphy of Milwaukee, second engineer, and George McGinnis, a deckhand, were washed about the lake for several hours lashed to pieces of wreckage, and were finally picked up by the tug Columbia and landed at East Tawas, Mich. Captain Place and his wife were drowned.

CRUSHED IN HIS MINE.

B. T. Wyatt had both bones in his arm broken, a severe cut in his forehead, and shoulder badly wounded by a bank caving in on him at his place, four miles west of Ashland yesterday afternoon. His son Lewis was piping near by and hastened to his rescue in time to dig him out alive.  
H. S. MULLT ENDS LIFE.

Lebanon, May 27.—H. S. Mullt, City Treasurer, committed suicide in his barn at this place Saturday afternoon by shooting himself in the mouth with a revolver. Mr. Mullt had been in poor health for about six months. About three months ago he was found in his store in an unconscious condition. In a few hours he was brought home and in a few days he was found in his bed, his health gradually failing after that, and he became very weak.  
Last Thursday he took cold and spent a very bad night. Friday he went to a hardware store and purchased a revolver. Saturday afternoon he went to his store and committed suicide. He was about 57 years of age. He and his family came here about seven years ago from Salem. He ran a feed store at this place until about three months ago. He left a wife and two grown daughters and a son. His wife and one of his daughters are in poor health. He was an honest and upright man in all his dealings, and his accounts are true.

Klamath Falls, May 29.—Henry H. Davis of Medford accidentally shot himself fatally here to day. Mr. Davis and his wife had been out boating on Ewanna lake. Mr. Davis had his shotgun along and in taking the gun out of the boat it was discharged, the contents entered his bowels just below the ribs. He died at 7:45 p. m.  
Mr. Davis left the Falls at midnight with the remains of her husband for Medford. Wm. Davis and wife started from Medford earlier in the evening to meet her. The deceased was about 25 years of age.

PIONEER MURDER RECALLED.  
Two Mysterious Strangers who Recently Visited the "Widow Long" Place on Applegate and are Believed to Have Unearthed a Hidden Treasure.  
One evening about three weeks ago three men in a covered hack drove up to the residence of James O'Brien on Applegate, whose place adjoins the "Long place" of pioneer times. They inquired if the old dog place was for sale or rent. If it was it was not after buying some milk of him for dose on rent to the old house and camped. An old Chinaman who lives in the house related that as soon as they had their supper they measured the ground and commenced to dig, working until early dawn. They had to be driven out of the place by the town and a party of men. They took out, hitched up their team about 5 o'clock and drove off, and so far no one has been able to learn where they went. They were in the box or wagon they received their information for its location is a mystery, as well as the identity of the three strangers. A recent incident has caused the renewed interest among the few old pioneers left in a story of many years ago which is here recalled as follows:  
About 4 miles below Rich on the Applegate, and some 12 miles from Jackson, some 36 years ago lived a widow whose name was Leupold and who was rich, and her mysterious murder was the sensation for many weeks in Southern Oregon.  
The wife of the tragically dead man was engaged to be married to a young man working on the place, and the time set for the wedding only a few days off. She was also a very good housewife, employed upon the place a Chinaman, who helped with the house work when not out on the Applegate.  
As the story goes, on the evening of the day the murder was discovered, the widow and her betrothed—the hired man were at the party and the hired man was engaged to be married to the widow.
