A Berlin dispatch says it is officially mounced that Germany desires to in-China from £12,000,000 to £14,000,000 because the first figure does not include expenses borne by Germany in China from May to July. A Washington dispatch says that another question has arisen as to who shall pay for the maintenance of the legation guards after the several countries have withdrawn their main forces. The legation guards are to be stationed at Peking for the protection of the several foreign establishments there, and their presence has been insisted on against the protest of China. It has been supposed that each government would pay for its own guard, but the point is now made that these guards are maintained owing to the inability of China to insure adequate protection, and that China therefore should bear the expense.

CLOUDBURST IN WEST VIRGINIA. Life and Destruction of

Property. Flooded by 86 hours of continuous rain, culminating in a cloudburst, narrow mountain valley in West Virginia, in the vicinity of Bluefield, became the channel of a great torrent of water Sunday, June 28. Towns were swept away, railroad and telegraph lines were destroyed, and hundreds of people were drowned as they struggled to

escape up the mountain sides. The loss of life is estimated at 450 and the loss of property at \$4,000,000, but these are only the crudest approximations, for communication with many of the villages was impossible. Reports from many places indicate, however, that hundreds of bodies are floating down with the flood.

The difficulty of getting relief to the district until the railway lines are re placed means that there will probably be great suffering among the people who were fortunate enough to save their lives, as all their stores were in towns that were swept away and the hillsides contain little but the upper works of the coal mines. Passenger Train No. 4 of the Norfolk

and Western railway reached Vivian about 8:30 o'clock Sunday morning, me the flood and was unable to procee farther. The waters reached such a depth that the coaches had to be abandoned, the passengers being rescued by means of ropes strung from the windows of the coaches to the tops of remaining coke ovens, some distance away. Between the Elkhorn and Vivian yards, a distance of ten miles, 100 cars are said to be washed from the tracks and many of them were carried down the stream.
