TEDDY STANDS IN.

The President Will Allow the supervisors to Appoint Forest Rangers.

Washington Dispatch.]

Representative Tongue today presented to the president a petition from citizens of Lake county, endorsed by the governor, state treasurer and secretary of state of Oregon, protesting against the dismissal of the present forestry officials of that state.

The petition contends that this force is generally competent and efficient, and it would be unjust and unwise to remove these officials and replace them with eastern college men who are unfamiliar with conditions in Oregon.

The president indicated that the present force in Oregon was not altogether made up of the best obtainable men, and that there were many among them who were incompetent. He, however, promised to give the petition thorough consideration.

In this connection, attention is called to a letter addressed by the present today to Secretary Hitchcock, directing him to hereafter leave the appointment of forest rangers to forest supervisors.

He told the secretary he wanted good, practical western men in the forests, men of experience and ability, and that he did not want the forests left in the hands of a lot of college dudes from the east.

IN FAVOR OF CRAWFORD.

The case of W. R. Willis against A. M. Crawford was called Friday. This case has previously been tried in this court, with Judge Hanna on the bench, the plaintiff winning. It was carried to the supreme court and reversed, being remanded for a new trial. Judge Willis alleges that Mr. Crawford, his law partner at the time, received a fee of \$10,400 from Capt. J. T. C. Nash, for negotiating the sale of \$80,000 worth of bonds of the Victory Placer Mining Co. The defendant denies that he received more than \$1,000 which he divided with the plaintiff. Plaintiff further alleges that he only received \$600 as his part of fee in transaction from defendant, leaving a balance due him of \$1,300 and interest from April 15, 1898. Plaintiff threatened demanded judgment against defendant in the sum of \$5,160 and costs and disbursements in this action. The jury returned a verdict in favor of Crawford.

It is said that the first apples grown in Oregon were from the seed of four apples, brought over from England by the Hudson Bay company, and planted in 1846, at Vancouver, by P. C. Pambourne, founder of the late Mrs. Dr. Barry of Oregon City, and Mrs. McCracken of Portland. It was 21 years before they bore fruit, which brings the first apples grown up to 1867.

The first battle of the Mexican war was fought on the 8th day of May in 1818. The news reached Oregon by ox teams driven by immigrants in the following October and the news of the termination of the war came by the same route and means and reached Oregon City in September 1847. More than six months after Gen. Scott had taken the city of Mexico. Life in old Oregon was different then, than now.

The De La Mar, Shasta county Enterprise, says Federal Collector Wm. Strain, has been astonished at the rapid growth of the saloon business in that place. When he visited De La Mar a year ago, there was one saloon, while this year there are twenty-two, counting the bars. That beats Yreka by six majorities.—Yreka Journal.
