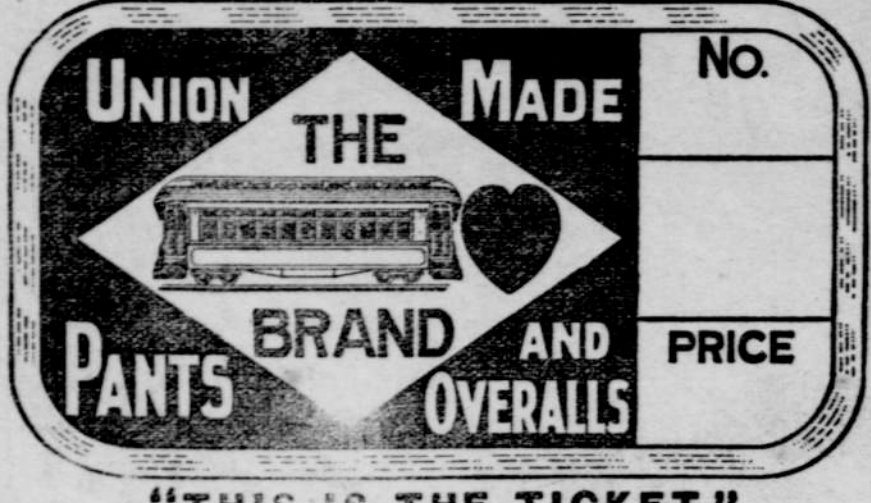

ASHLAND, Or., Thursday, May 29, 1902

Roseburg Review: W. W. Cardwell left this morning for Cape Nome to look after his mining interests. He will be joined at Seattle in a day or two by Wiley Pilkington and his son Ira. They expect to sail from Seattle to the far north next Sunday. Mr. Cardwell is said to have some very valuable mining claims in the Cape Nome district. Jas. B. Crawford has been in charge of them during the past winter.

The university of California defeated the Princeton athletic team in a final meet held at Princeton, N. J., by the score of 7 to 6. California having made the best of the lot in the sprints and hurdles, and Princeton showing up stronger in the distance and field events.

Karl Mann, the vegetarian, won the international pedestrian match from Berlin to Dresden. The distance covered was 135 miles, and Mann's time was 27h. 13 min. 14 1/2 sec. The next man, a meat-eater, finished one hour and 45 minutes behind Mann.

All the evidence tended to show that there is an agreement among the packers in various cities by which competition is done away with, business being allotted in shares and prices fixed.
