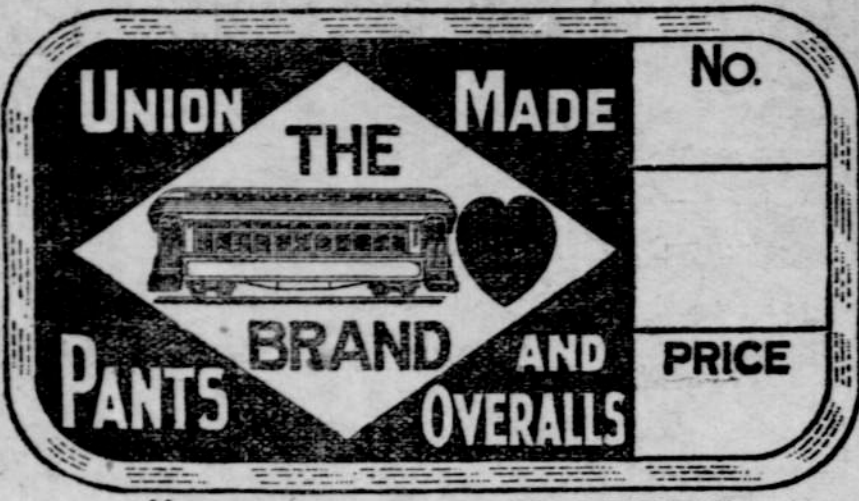

BORING FOR COAL.

Salem, June 30.—A company of New York capitalists today began drilling on the Blair farm in the Waldo hills east of Salem, to ascertain whether coal exists there of quality and quantity to make mining profitable. In 1890 pieces of coal were found in a creek on the farm and upon search the outcroppings of a stratum of coal was found on a hillside. The vein of coal and slate six feet thick was followed into the hills 100 feet. The men now at work have drilled 30 feet through sandstone and from the nature of the sandstone formation are led to believe that the prospects are good for finding coal of merchantable quality. The coal found in the tunnel made fire sufficiently hot to weld a bar of iron an inch thick and cooked well. The men are confident that the coal will be of still better quality. The Diamond Drill Contracting Company of Spokane, has the contract to drill 100 to 1000 feet, according to what may be found.
