

WALTER O. WYANT KILLED.

Son of B. T. Wyant Meets Death by Explosion of Blast in Shasta County

B. T. Wyant and son Lewis on Friday received the sad news by wire of the sudden death of Walter O. Wyant of this place at the Gladstone mine of Jilson & Roberts at French Gulch, Shasta county. Deceased was aged 27 years, one month and 5 days. He was a single man and a native of Lane county, though the last twenty years of his life was spent in the eighborhood of Ashland.

He was a fine young man and leaves many friends who sympathize with the afflicted family in their great loss. The deceased was a first-class miner and had been employed in three of the big mines in this section—The Ashland, Shorty-Hope and the Mattern.


