"With the establishment of the minimum Selective Service age at 18, the Army was compelled to assure itself that there would be no interruption in the flow of professionally and technically trained men who have hitherto been provided in regular increments by American colleges and universities," said Gen. George C. Marshall, Chief of Staff, in the foreword to a booklet of questions and answers on the Army Specialized Training Program.
