Did you ever stall an unpleasant job as long as it could be stalled? We natives are very proud of our fishing here in Central Oregon and hate to admit that there are times when it isn't up to par.

The past two weeks have been the toughest fishing, the writer has ever seen here at this time of year.

Fishing has been definitely improving the past few days; and this in the face of the makers of "fishing calendars," who say this is the poorest part of the month for fishing.

On the Deschutes, the trout, particularly the browns, are feeding during the late evening. The difficulty appears to be to match the bug that is on the water. Some dandy big browns are being taken on everything from a No. 18 ginger quill or blue upright to a No. 6 bucktail éoachman.

Metolius river has been producing some fish on a small blue upright. Little danger of excceding the limit however.

Crooked River has been good on a small caddis. It produces the most beautiful rainbows that grow; not overly big, but fat and beautifully colored.

Paulina and East Lakes are both picking up. Some big browns have been taken on fly from East lake the past few days and Paulina has produced both browns and rainbows.

Elk Lake, while not producing too many fish, is certainly producing some of the finest rainbows I have ever seen, nice fat ones, ranging from a pound and half to over five pounds.

Diamond Lake is producing some fine rainbows, mostly on bait and troll. Fly fishing should be good but have had no reports on it.
