The first promotion for shavetails will come considerably slower under a new War Department order requiring that second lieutenants hereafter must serve at thre month service-in-grade requirement had been in effect.

To become eligible for promoor first lieutenant, officers must have demonstrated their qualifications for promotion by occupation of a position and performance of duties appropriate to the next higher grade for at least three months.

In the case of second lieutenants, first lieutenants and captains who have clearly demonstrated their eligibility for advancement by outstanding performance in actual combat, the minimum service requirement may be waived.
