## Hayes Composes "Modern" Waltz Likely to Click

S/Sgt. Jack Hayes, Camp Abbot's most prolific composer, came through this week with "Valse Grotesque," a departure from run-of-the-mill waltz treatments and a composition which might conceivably find an appreciative national audience should the work reach an interested publisher.

Played by the 28-piece Camp Abbot band this week, the selection evoked requests that the work be published both from bandmen and a small audience which heard the composition before its introduction to the public. Hayes declined to indicate whether he intends to submit the work to a publishing concern.

Scored especially for the relatively small post band, the arrangement imparted a "fullness" seldom heard by this reviewer in military bands of considerably more pieces.

"Valse Grotesque" represents an effort toward departure from waltzes usually played by military bands and an attempt at providing a different and less blatant type of arrangement. By substituting string basses for tubas and altering the rhythmic pattern, the composer has succeeded in doing both.

The "grotesque" quality is established in the introduction through the use of orthodox chord structure combined with a plaintive and somewhat eccentric melodic strain.

Hayes gives the theme a modern treatment in thirds with reeds carrying the melody. A second melodic interlude is arranged in four part harmony, another sprightly innovation of the modernist school. Although the composition is relatively short and bears a single key signature, a generous use of chromatic harmony carries the melody through a number of brilliant changes, gives it a certain crispness and provides the dramatic emphases which mark the work an interesting departure from the nostalgic and stereotyped waltz version.

Hayes has written several selections for military and dance bands previously, including an official ERTC march. His first venture into the field of more modern composition was a suite for band, and the waltz is the second. Prior to his induction, Hayes was an arranger for NBC in Hollywood and for Universal Studios. His arrangements of well-known compositions have been a regular feature of concerts by the post band.

## Cadre Members To Fire Carbine

In compliance with a War Department memorandum all members of the ERTC cadre who do not have a familiarization firing recorded on their service records will be required to fire the sub-machine gun and carbine. Officers, Warrant Officers and members of the Camp Abbot band will also fire the pistol for familiarization.

Instruction classes started this week and will extend through November 26. Twenty classes have been formed from the various divisions of the cadre and will involve two separate periods. The first phase will cover preliminary instruction in the mechanism and firing of the Tommy gun and carbine; on the Sunday following each class week day preliminary instruction actual firing will take place on the range. Each individual will bring a lunch on the all-day firing periods. Firing will be for familiarization only, not for qualification. Individual scores will be recorded. Ammunition allowance will be 40 rounds for the carbine; 25 rounds for the Tommy gun, and 25 rounds for pistol.
