

Abbot Cagers Scalp Indian Braves

Double Win on Reservation Last Week End

Two Camp Abbot basketball teams turned tables last Saturday on two All-Indian teams at the Warm Springs Indian Reservation to scalp both the high school team and the All-Reservation quintet. Five hundred howling braves witnessed the double-header.

Company C, of the 51st Eng. Trng. Bn., scored the initial success of the evening by coming from behind to defeat the Warm Spring High School team, 46 to 32, in the preliminary contest. Whatever the Indian lads lacked in stature they compensated for by using a fast, aggressive floor game.

In the main event, Dazolea and Winnishut led the Indians' attack with 10 and eight points, respectively. The Camp Abbot varsity squad turned on a powerhouse attack and showed the All-Reservation team no mercy as they drilled the hoop for a total of 82 points, while the diminutive Indian athletes managed to sneak in 28. Coach Leo Frizzo substituted freely in order to try out various combinations.

Corporal Tucker again led the scoring with seven field goals, and one free throw, while Lts. Allbright and Butts both tallied six baskets apiece for the rangy Abbotmen.

Half Million Discharged Since 1941

Approximately 550,000 officers and enlisted men have been honorably discharged from the Army between December 7, 1941, and August 31, 1943, the War Department has announced.

The figure does not include those discharged to accept appointment in other branches of the armed forces, but does include approximately 200,000 men over 38 years of age who were discharged to accept employment in essential industry or agriculture.

Of the remaining 350,000 discharges, a large majority was for physical and mental disability.
