land.

In outlining the program, Col. Turrill said:

"The objective of the Fourth War Loan Drive is to achieve the goal of 'Ninety and Ten' in Class 'A' pay reservations for civilians as well as cash purchases. By 'Ninety and ten' is meant a minimum of ninety per cent of the total number of civilians employed, investing at least ten per cent of their gross pay in war bonds. Already, ninety-eight per cent of the civilians at Camp Abbot are investing almost nine per cent of their wages, an enviable record for an installation this size. The mission now for civilians is to strive to obtain one hundred per cent participation and to raise the percentage of gross earnings invested to ten per cent or greater.

"The objective of the drive for military personnel is also at least 90 per cent participation, with 10 per cent of pay. It is realized that many soldiers with families may find it difficult to allot 10 per cent of their pay in war bonds. However, the minimum allowable monthly allotment of \$3.75 should not be too great a financial burden.

"A further objective of the drive is the purchase of at least one bond for cash by everybody between now and Feb. 29."

Lieutenant Crisman said that to accommodate trainees and

others whose duty hours make the purchase of bonds difficult the finance office in Building 202 will be open daily from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., including Sundays and on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings from 7 to 10 p. m.

Lt. Crisman also announced that the purchase of \$2,625 worth of bonds between Jan. 1 and the opening date of the drive will be applied to the drive total.

Camp Abbot's solicitation campaign, as outlined by Col. Besson, provides for the following "plan of attack;" Jan. 18-25, publicity and education for the drive; Jan. 25-Feb. 1, personal contact of personnel and active solicitation of all units, from staff divisions through the smallest unit or section, with enlisted men handling solicitation of other enlisted men, officers other officers and civilian employees other civilian employees. On Feb. 1, the plan will revert to the publicity and education program until Feb. 8, when another intensive solicitation campaign will be held until the drive officially ends Feb. 15.

The post's proposed program drew praise from Mr. Cooper at the Tuesday night meeting. "I only hope civilians in other communities will emulate Camp Abbot personnel in supporting the drive," he said.

Gray Ladies Soon To Begin Training

All candidates for the Gray Ladies Unit that is being formed to serve in the Station Hospital have been interviewed and sixteen women have been selected for the course of instruction, Miss Lorraine Anderson, Hospital Red Cross Field Director, stated. Women were chosen on the basis of temperament, talent and willingness to serve one day a week. Mrs. R. W. Hemingway will serve as unit chairman.

An intensive lecture course is now being prepared by Lt. Col. Bedessem, Station Hospital commanding Officer, in hospital background, the psychology of the sick, medical ethics, military organization, recreational therapy, and related subjects. Personnel of the hospital medical staff will give the talks.

After four lectures the women will be permitted to work in the Recreation Hall, where they will provide friendly services to the patients who are not bed-ridden. The complete course will have to be completed before the Gray Ladies will be allowed to visit the wards to help sick soldiers.

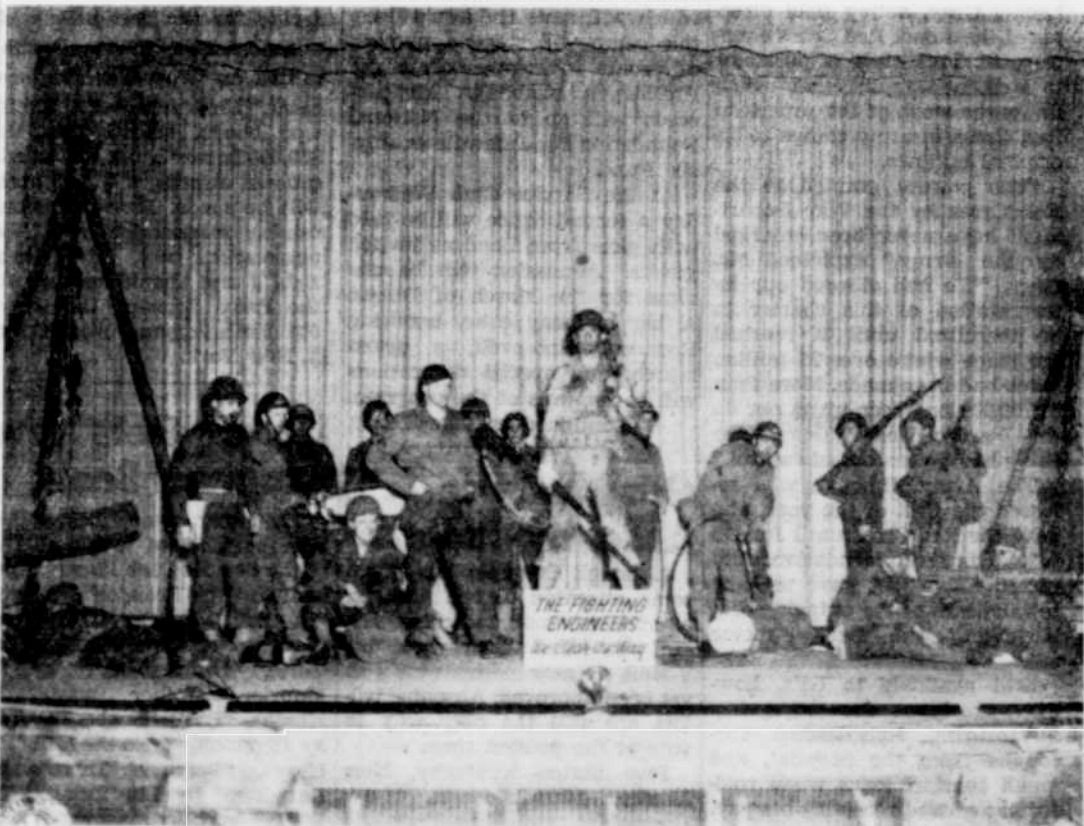
400 Register at Library in Month
