## All Cadre Units Begin Refresher Training Course

A refresher training program prescribed by the War Department for overhead enlisted personnel started on the post Monday. All cadre units are taking part, with a modified schedule planned for the Wac Detachment.

The training requirements have been divided into two basic groups: Military and Pioneer subjects, and Weapons subjects. The former includes map reading, malaria control, mine fields and booby traps. Upon the completion of this phase, scheduled for March 9, a second schedule will be published covering Weapons requirements, including the infiltration course, familiarization firing, and rifle marksmanship.

The program is described by a War Department circular as providing all personnel regardless of physical deficiencies, with certain minimum training. "Economy of manpower demands maximum utilization of personnel with physical defects to replace personnel qualified for overseas service," the order read.
