Post Cage Squad Lays Claim to Basketball Title

Riding the crest of an 11 game winning streak, Camp Abbot's Fighting Engineers now are prepared to lay claim to the state GI basketball title. Coach Leo Frizzo's post team throttled the Camp White 96th Division 33-32 Saturday and raced away from the Wooden Box quintet of Bend, 55-26 Tuesday. Both games were played at the All-Purpose recreation hall.

A 40 foot howitzer by Lt. Bob Demgen arched in dramatically with one minute and fifteen seconds left to break up the Camp White contest.

Abbot's unblemished record was in peril all the way until Demgen put in the clincher as White's "football - basketball" tactics forced a slowing down of the powerful Engineer offense.

Although never having more than a four point margin, the 96th Division invaders let most of the way in the roughest tussle of the local season. Division let at half, 18-15. The Engineers played without the services of their ace rebound man, Lt. Norm Butz, who was ill.

Lt. Rector, player-coach of the losers, was high-point man with 14 points. Sgt. Don Tucker paced Abbot with 11. Lt. Demgen had 8.

Playing sloppy ball on their own hook and encountering stubborn resistance, the post quintet woke up at the end of the first half of their game with Wooden Box to find themselves trailing, 16-15. The situation was more than righted in the next period as Abbot turned on the power-40 points to 15 points-to romp home with victory No. 11, 55-26.

It was also game No. 11 in which Tucker has scored at least 10, This time the Southwestern Kansas sharpshooter poured in 12. Long shot artist Demgen also racked up 12. Bog Douglas paced the Wooden Box five with 10. Pvt. Frank Heniges, ex-Pacific Coast Conference arbiter, refereed.

Three periods are devoted to them. The anti-tank men learn to lay mines in several positions, and, later, to lay hasty and deliberate mine fields. One group of men will lay a field and another de-activate it.

In addition, realistic training films prepared by the Signal Corps are shown from time to time. Here actual battle scenes are presented, and the men are able to fit their training into the picture of war conditions.

A special course prepared by the training division is at pres ent being given to all overhead personnel to acquaint them with booby traps and mines as part of the processing program to prepare men for overseas
