# Over 9 Million Now in Service

22 million men now registered for the draft already are in service, Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of the Selective Service System, announced recently in releasing a breakdown of the draft situation in the United States.

The breakdown, which covers draft registrants between the ages of 18 and 38, follows:
