

Civilian Workers Form Association

A new association of the civilian employees of Camp Abbot is rapidly approaching the stages of final organization, according to an announcement by J. J. O'Donnell, Civilian Personnel head. "The purpose of the organization," he said, "covers a wide field of endeavor." The successful prosecution of the war effort; a promotion of good will and fellowship throughout the post; the improvement of working conditions and facilities; an outlet for social and recreational activities, and the relief of civilian personnel in emergencies are some of the aims of the club.

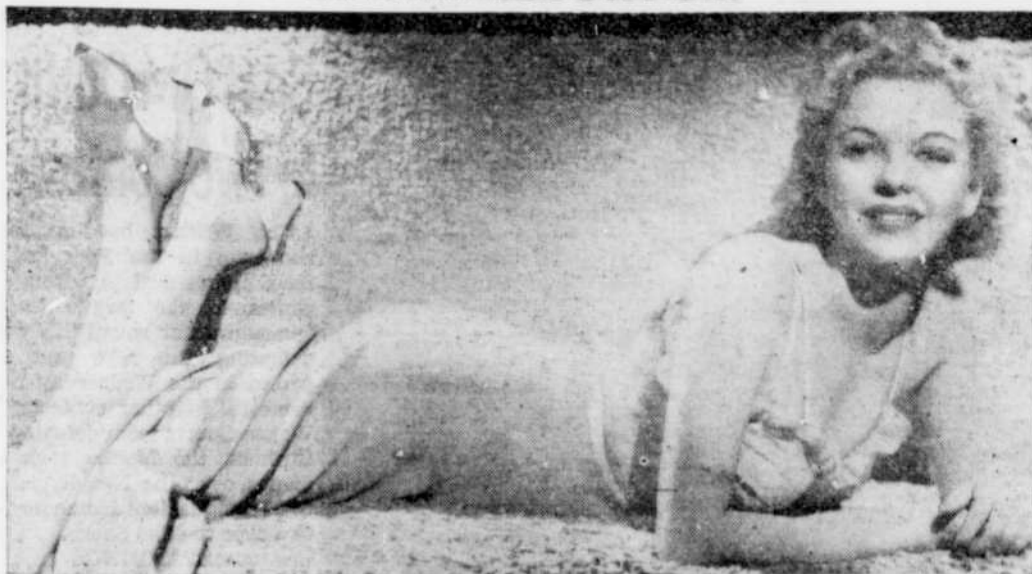

"However, there is another kind of training that is just as important as physical training. This training to which I refer is, 'Training the Soul of Faith in God.' Put the faith of God in your men, and you will have a soldier. Without that faith, a man lives in fear. God created the ground upon which Camp Abbot is located. He created the men that are training here. He gave us our soul, and the power to think. He is the only one who knows when you will die; or when I shall die. If God can create a machine such as man He also has the power to save or let that man be destroyed by the enemy. All the training that I can get here at Camp Abbot, or any other training camp, is not going to bring me back from the war without the Grace of God.
