merely supplement that care, utilizing the patient's leisure time in educational pursuits and physical reconditioning. The program is divided into two parts: Educational and Physical. Capt. Donald D. Fowler has been named Educational Officer. He will be assisted by Lorraine V. Anderson and Gertrude Pearl, both of the Red Cross. Lt. Casimir F. Plasewicz, of Supplemental Training Company, has been designated Physical Officer. He will work with Lt. Clara M. Andrews, physiotherapist.

Every patient entering the hospital will be placed in a class ranging from 1 to 4, under the new plan. When convalescence begins, the patient, on recommendation of the ward officer, will be placed in class 4. This class will be composed of patients who are still in bed. Their part in the program will be more on the educational and less on the physical side. When these patients have recovered sufficiently to be up and around, but are still receiving active medical treatment, they will be put in class 3. This will permit them to participate in slightly more strenuous physical recreation and training.

Activity Increased

When medical treatment is completed, the patient will be transferred to ward 138, to be known as the Convalescent Barracks. Here, more fully recuperated, the patient will enter class 2. In this class, he will undergo an even more strenuous course of training. He will be put on a six-hour activity program to include exercise, drill and recreation.

Class 1 will consist of men nearest the point of complete recovery. Their daily physical training should enable them to

engage in an eight-hour program, fitting them to pass a physical test before returning to duty. Thus, when a soldier is discharged to duty he will be physically and mentally prepared to step in where he left off.

The educational part of the new program will include music appreciation, orientation lectures, discussions of current topics, films, arts and crafts, model building, games and various amusements. Limited training facilities, such as rigging racks and rifle marksmanship sighting devices, will be provided. Plans are being made to establish a library for the exclusive use of the four classes.

Physical training will be modified and progressive. It will be given with a view of exercising the patient sufficiently, but not too strenuously in view of his physical condition.
