Last week the Baltimore American celebrated its 129th anniversary.

Even at that the American is not very old. It has reached its second childhood and bids fair to reach another one hundred and twenty nine years before it passes out of existence.

Unlike the spinster who attains so great an age, the American has changed its name several times.

It is said that its first editor was wedded to it but it did not take his name but was called the Maryland Journal and Baltimore Advertiser.

This appellation sounded much better than if the founder, Mr. Goddard, had called it his better-half of some other equally endearing name.

After twenty years of wedded life with the sheet Mr. Goddard relinquished his right in favor of William Pechin who called it the Intelligencer. He in turn gave up the pursuit of happiness in favor of Alexander Martin who, in 1799, conferred upon the journal the name of Baltimore American.

Twice since the latter name was given it the control of the paper has passed into different hands, but it has always upheld its position as one of the greatest republican newspapers in the south and its name and place among the journals of the union will probably outlive for many years its present owners.
