The force of men will be increased on the Columbia Southern Irrigation Co's work, as fast as men can be found to work until they have a good force at work, they are offering \$2 per day for men and \$4 for man and team.

Henry Smith, son of Sheriff Smith, of Prineville, who left his school work in that city to accept a position with the Columbia Southern Irrigation Co., came over from Prineville last Saturday and immediately entered upon the discharge of his duties.

Mrs. Med. Vanderpool of Prineville, came over on Monday and returned on Tuesday, Miss Ethel Philliber and Miss Maud Vanderpool returned to Prineville with her. The young ladies have spent three weeks in this neighborhood living on a homestead.

Rev. Clark, and Robert Hotchkiss drove over from Sisters on Wednesday, where they have been holding a Revival meeting the past week they report good interest and 4 conversions, to the church. While here

they expect to arrange to preach in this place on the 4th, Sunday of each month.

Mr. O. Riley, proprietor of the Pilot Butte Hotel has force of men at work building a bridge across the Deschutes river, on his farm four miles below this city. General News.

The Seattle Street Car Strike has been declared off and most of the strikers are working again. Both parties having agreed to arbitrate their differences.

By request of Receiver Lang, of The Dalles Land Office, Miss Francis N. Osborne, formerly a clerk in the accountant division of the General Land Office, has been transferred and will now be Receiver's clerk at The Dalles.

During his tour, the President will have direct communication, by special wire, with the White House both day and night, in case any matter needs his attention he will Telegraph his decision to Assistant Secretary Forester, who will be in charge there, and announce the decisions.

Frank E. Vaughn, a former clerk in the Land Office at Vancouver, Wash. was appointed as Register of that office, by the President, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of W. R. Dunbar. During the illness and at the time of Mr. Dunbar's death, Mr. Vaughn had acted as Register, his work had been so satisfactory to the Department that the President made the appointment without waiting for the approval of the Washington delegation in Congress.

In the first speech made by the President, on his western tour, delivered before an audience, of at least 6000, in the great Auditorium at Chicago, he defined and upheld the Monroe Doctrine in a plain straight-forward manner which left no room for doubt as to where he stood in regard to enforcing this, much abused, unwritten law. He also advocated the maintenance of our Navy up to a point where it would prove ample protection in case of war, and at the same time prevent war by commanding the respect of foreign nations.

The death of H. W. Corbett, of Portland, while it removes from our midst, a man ripe in years, but one who never left his post of duty or laid aside his harness until the last call came, yet he will be greatly missed by those who have worked with him and by him for years.

He was born at Westboro, Mass., February 18, 1827. Arrived at Portland, March 5, 1851. Served as United States Senator 1866-72.

President of the First National Bank of Portland. Elected President Lewis and Clark Centennial January 21, 1902. Died March 31, 1903. Funeral from the First Presbyterian Church April 2.

He was always known as a tireless worker, brave in the discharge of whatever he felt to be his duty, always ready to assist in any work for the upbuilding of Portland, or

the general interests of the State. Oregon has lost a grand old man and her citizens, as a people, will deeply mourn his loss.

Since the expiration of his term as Representative, Malcolm A. Moody has remained in Washington, doing some good work in the interest of the Indian war veterans of Oregon and Washington Territory, to secure what is justly due them from the government and which should have been paid them by the terms of the Act of Congress of June 27, 1902. Mr. Moody has succeeded in having the muster rolls transferred from the pension Office to the War Department, where they will be available when claims come in, he has also discovered a blunder by which many of the soldiers were only allowed \$11. per month and 40 cents per day for furnishing a horse when they should have received \$2 per day for each. It is very probable that success will crown his efforts and the old soldiers will at last receive what should have been paid years ago.
