THE TRUSTS.

The trust craze, that has raged in the East for three years seems to be rather overdone, and now some of the promoters and financial giants of Wall street, are crying hard times. The dear people have failed to rush in and buy all the stock and securities that J. P. Morgan and his associates have thrown on the market, watering them almost beyond recognition. Some of the corporations, such as the International Mercantile Marine, better known as the shipping trust, had the water-cure administered in such frightful proportions that her ultimate recovery is almost despaired of. Now, if the general public will hold aloof and let the promoters and organizers carry the load that they now have, it may be the means of restraining such work, and in a measure, solve the trust question. The recent clash between Harriman and Keene, over the Southern Pacific stock, has not only made Mr. Keene to squeal, but has thrown some light on the intentions of these two, as to the handling, and shrinking or inflating the values of stock, to fill their own pockets, while the dear people furnish the money.

The Government has won the case against the Northern Security Company, and the Anti-trust Law is upheld, the decision of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals holds that; the Merger destroyed competition between the two great roads, by removing any motive for it and is therefore a violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The decree forbids the voting of stocks in the merged roads by the Security Company, and forbids the roads to submit to the orders of the that company.

Verily, the road of the Trust magnate, in all his glory, is not devoid of thorns. At least 3000 corporations in Illinois who have failed to comply with the anti-trust law of that state, are to be prosecuted and the penalty for failure to comply with this law is a fine of \$50.00 per day. The Prosecuting Attorneys throughout the state are instructed to proceed against them at once; In New Jersey the Governor has issued his annual proclamation dissolving all corporations that have not paid the annual tax, 927 of them, representing a stock of \$239,000,000, which is mostly fictitious values.

A. E. Reames, of Jackson county was named as Democratic nominee for Representative in Congress for the First District, on first ballot, at the Convention held at Albany, Or. April 11, 03. Harmony of thought and action was the order of the day. The usual denunciations of the Republican party were adopted and included in the platform.

If we may judge from the small number of candidates before the convention, the political plums on the Democratic tree surely appear very small to the regular office seekers of that party.

The Shaniko doctor who would not tell smallpox from an eruption caused by poison oak should report at once to the Board of Medical Examiners for the leather medal,

to which he is clearly entitled. The incident proves among other things, that a medical diploma is not always a certificate of ability to detect ordinary disease and prescribe intelligently for its treatment. Oregonian.—From recent events in another town in Eastern Oregon, the Shaniko doctor is not the only one who could not tell the smallpox from some other ailment, which proved to be smallpox in a severe form.

Dr. Hutchinson the State Health officer, advises that every one throughout the country should be vaccinated in order to stamp out the smallpox. The citizens of this section should act at once and compel every one to either be vaccinated or isolate them, and the trouble will soon be over with the dread disease. In view of the fact that the recent sickness in this neighborhood might have been a mild form of smallpox every precaution should be taken to avoid any spread of it.

From private advices, we learn that Mr. Hammond owner of the Corvallis and Eastern Railroad, made a trip to the eastern terminus of that road, last week, and took with him a crew of surveyors, this looks as if we might have a railroad into this section in the near future, even though the Columbia Southern does not reach here this season.

General News.

The Dalles, Ore., has four cases of Smallpox.

President Roosevelt, is hunting Mountain Lions and other large game in Yellowstone Park.

The latest scandal in high life, has been discovered in alleged frauds in the Post Office Department in New York and Washington D. C.

Mayor Harrison of Chicago, will succeed himself to that office, but he was only elected by a plurality of 7679, rather small compared to his former election, when his plurality reached 65,000.

Another death from Smallpox is reported from Shaniko, the victim of that dread disease, was Mr. Morgan, a young man who has been working there for some time. We were unable to obtain any further particulars before going to press.

Brigham Young, Head of the Mormon Church, died at Salt Lake City, on April 11, after a lingering illness. Apostle Young was the second son and fourth child of the late Brigham Young. It is conjectured, that the position of President will now fall to some one outside of the Young family, for the first time since 1835.

Hon. Binger Herman, of Douglas County. Was nominated as Representative in Congress for First Oregon District, at the Convention held at Eugene, Oregon, on the 9th day of April. It was a hard fight and for a time it looked as though the opposition would defeat him.

Mr. Herman won on the 24th, Ballot after falling as low as 29 votes in the 16th, his supporters rallied and gained steadily from the opposition until the 24th he received 95 and then on motion, of Kay of Marion, Herman was declared unanimous choice of the convention.
