Walter J. Bivens, who has been under a physicians care, at Prineville, for several weeks, is much improved and returned to Deschutes this week.

The Pilot Butte Inn, will not be open to the traveling public until after the smallpox epidemic has abated in our neighboring towns, or until further notice.

Mr. S. M. Dorrance, who has charge of the P. B. D. Co's mill is a competent mill man, and has put the mill in fine condition and will soon have it running on full time.

Hon. C. B. Bellinger, who has the appointing of U. S. Commissioners, advises that parties having unfinished business before Ex-commissioner Reed, may complete the same before his successor.

Mr. L. P. Stephens of Spooner Minn., who has spent some time in, our town looking after business interests, and enjoying the fishing along with a well developed case of grippe, left for his home the first of the week.

Mrs. W. H. Staats and Mrs. Frank Hodson, are both confined to their beds, with the same disease that has prevailed here for some time. It is very much like the La grippe, and is accompanied by a very severe sore throat.

Mr. Percival, who has been acting as foreman on The Oregonian at Silver Lake, passed through town, last Wednesday, on his way to Prineville where he will work on the Journal staff. Mr. Bailey now has charge of the first named paper.

We have also been requested to announce, that no accommodations can be obtained at any of the usual stopping places, or at any private house between this place and Silver Lake, until after the smallpox epidemic has subsided at Prineville, and other points on either side.

The young men of this place, have organized a Baseball Club, and in a short time will be prepared to accept a challenge from anything short of a Pacific Coast League team. The list of subscribers has 30 names on it, and the club has the support of the majority of our citizens.

Our citizens are becoming alarmed over the smallpox at Prineville and at other points along the roads leading to this section, and have been vaccinating and taking every precaution to prevent any contagion from outside sources. The Staats Hotel and Stables, will be closed until further notice, and there is to be no exceptions to this rule.

At the regular meeting of the Deschutes Baseball Association, held on Wednesday, it was decided that we should celebrate in this city on July 4th, committees were appointed to attend to the preliminary work and the Association will push the work for a grand, old time, celebration. Lack of space forbids us giving details or the names of the committees.

Mr. A. Smith of Sisters, spent a day in Deschutes this week, Mr. Smith informed us, that he has disposed of his entire interest in the home ranch; the townsite property and the mercantile business, of Smith Bros., to M. J. Wilt, a prominent catteman of that place. The consideration was not made known. Mr. Smith still holds his homestead in that section and has not yet decided on a new location.

One night this week, some poor deluded wretch, whose very soul would have room and to spare in a peanut shell, entered the P. B. D. Co's sawmill and either destroyed or carried away some of the parts of the engine which they had removed, for the apparent purpose of crippling the engine and delaying work as the mill was ready to start the next morning. This is the second attempt to damage the Co's property, that has been made in the last six months.

Every precaution will be taken to prevent any one from being exposed, until all danger has passed. Mr. John Sizemore of Deschutes is nursing the sick man.

PRINEVILLE ITEMS.

Miss Ronda claypool, who has been very low with smallpox, is now thought to be out of danger.

Born--To the wife of Joe Lister, of Paulina, on April 17, in this city, an eight pound girl. Mother and child are doing nicely.

Mr. Bond, one of the smallpox patients at the pest-house, died on Friday, April 18. This is a very sad case as Mr. Bond's family are at Shaniko, and a daughter now has smallpox and is an inmate of the pest-house in that city.

W. W. Taggart, and L. Dillon, were sent to the pest-house Monday morning, and the Poindexter Hotel and its inmates were placed under quarantine. The authorities are working almost day and night to stop the epidemic, and up to the present time, no one has broken out except those who were in the room, or waited upon the late Howard Dillon, at some time during his sickness.

Married--On April 17, 03, at the home of Mrs. Hugh Lister in Prineville, Oreg., Mr. W. T. Fogle and Miss Etta Montgomery, Rev. H. C. Clark, officiating. Mr. Fogle is well known as former Editor and Publisher of the Crook County Journal, and Miss Montgomery is a daughter of one of our prominent cattlemen, J. M. Montgomery of Crooked river. The good wishes of the Echo go with the happy couple and we hope that our brother editor will never become an old Fogle.

Died at Prineville, Apr. 18, 03. Mr. Chas. E. McDowell, the well known proprietor of the Prineville Hotel, passed away a few hours after an operation had been performed, for a long standing case of appendicitus.

Chas. E. McDowell, was born in Ripley Co. Indiana, Aug 15, 1864; came to Oregon Dec. 1883, settled near Brownsville, Linn Co; married to Miss May King, Feb. 15, 1888; came to Prineville in 1898, where he has been engaged in the restaurant and Hotel business.

Died April 18, 03, aged 38 years 8 Mo. 3 days. He leaves a wife, Father and Mother, Brother and one Sister. The funeral services were held at his home and conducted by Rev. H. C. Clark, after which his remains were accompanied to the Cemetery by the members of the I. O. O. F., K. of P. and W of W, lodges. In his death his family have lost a loving son and a devoted husband, and the community has lost an honest, upright, aggressive and prosperous business man, and a man loved by many and respected by all.
