Herbert Rideout the genial clerk at the store of Solomon Johnson & Co. of Prineville, spent a day in our town, the first of the week.

Mr. J. L. Keever has moved his bed, board, tent and all, from their former location near the hotel to a point on the river bank near the Echo office.

R. G. Smith and family of Prineville, spent several days visiting with Mrs. Smith's Mother and Sister, Mrs. Baldwin and daughter, who are at the Hotel Sizemore.

Marshall Curry, a young man who has been working for Mr. Staats, had the misfortune to be kicked by a horse, last Thursday, although not seriously injured he will not be able to resume work for several days.

Through a mistake made at Prineville one day this week, the mail pouch intended for Culver and Haystack, came to this office, but owing to crowded quarters of the temporary postoffice there such mistakes are almost unavoidable.

At a special meeting of the school directors, held last Monday, it was decided to close the public school here for the present, and the Board will confer with the County Health Board as to any further action to prevent smallpox getting into this neighborhood.

Postmaster Staats, informs us that the mail going south from this place to Silver Lake, Lakeview and way points, has all been returned to his office unopened, this state of affairs has existed for about ten days, and is becoming a serious matter as some very important mail goes by this route.

A party of timber people, arrived in our town one day this week, who had driven all the way from The Dalles, via Warm Spring Agency. A few years ago this was about the only means of getting into this country, but since the Columbia southern road has been built to Shauiko, it is a rare thing that this drive is made.

We have for sale several good farms, a fine fruit ranch, choice timber lands, residence properties in Prineville and lots in Deschutes. A few choice timber claims for location. Palmer Bros., Prineville.

The latest reports from the smallpox is as follows: Lava, one case doing well; Prineville, no new cases since the first of the week, all cases doing nicely except Mrs. Turner who is quite sick.

We are in receipt of a letter from Rev. R. L. Alter of Prineville, stating that he would fill his appointment here when the smallpox epidemic has subsided, and this city was no longer afraid to hold public gatherings or to open their doors to people from our neighboring city Dr. Holt of Portland expects to accompany him when he comes.

Dr. Hyde, the county physician, passed through our town, last Monday, on his return from a trip to Lava where he went to look after a case of smallpox. He reported Guy Reese as having a very severe case of the dread disease, and also that other parties in that neighborhood had been exposed, they will be kept under quarantine until all danger has passed.

One day this week, the P. B. D. Co.'s team was crossing the river on the bridge just below the Staats place, with a large load of logs for the mill, when one wheel broke through the planking and came near being a serious accident, but the wagon remained upright and no damage was done. The broken plank have been removed and new ones put in.

At the school-meeting for this district, called for the purpose of voting bonds to pay for the new school house and furniture, which met at 2 P. M. Saturday, April 25, a question arose as to the meeting being illegal on the grounds that the present clerk of the Board was not a legal voter in the district, at the time of his election as clerk.

After a lively debate and a tie vote on the question, a motion to adjourn prevailed which left the bond issue open for future consideration.

PRINEVILLE ITEMS.

Business is practically at a stand still.

The public school has been closed until the regular fall term.

Sheriff Smith wears a smiling countenance since his release from quarantine.

The smallpox is still raging here but is now well under control and all the patients doing nicely.

The rush of timber seekers has fallen off very fast the last week and will almost cease entirely for some time.

During the quarantine of the postoffice, our genial merchant Will Wurzweiler, is acting postmaster, ably assisted by A. H. Grant. The temporary quarters in the Bank building are small and it makes the work very difficult, and the people should be very thankful to receive their mail as prompt as they do, under the circumstances.

Died.-At his home in this city at 5. 15 P. M. Friday, April 24, 03, John Cyrus passed peacefully out of this world, after a struggle lasting for years against that dread disease, tuberculosis.

Mr. Cyrus was born in Linn Co. Oregon, Mar. 12, 1872, came with his parents to Crook county in 1882 they settled in the Haystack section and have resided in the county since that time; Jan. 3, 1897, he was married to Miss Elvira Dillon, who with their infant son, now survive him. The funeral service held at 3.30 P. M. April 25, was conducted by Rev. Triplett, of the Baptist church, under the auspices

of the Knights of the Maccabees, of which order he was a member and beneficiary to the amount of \$3,000. At the time of his death he was a member of the Baptist church, which organization he joined several years ago; he has been engaged in the Barber business for a number of years and also in the Jewelry business, which he purchased from W. H. Cyrus, in 1902.

He leaves Father, Mother, four brothers, two sisters, a son and his devoted wife, who has been so faithful through his years of suffering, and who now has the loving sympathy of a sorrowing community, for he was loved and respected by all who knew him.
