They will live in the Benham house for a time and until there is no possible danger of contagion although every precaution has already been taken and every thing thoroughly disinfected.

A. W. Mohr, a Civil and Mechanical Engineer, of The Dalles, spent Monday in our city. Mr. Mohr has just returned from a tour of inspection in the timber belt south of here and is well pleased with the prospects of this country. He left for his home on Tuesday and will go by way of Haystack and the Warm Spring Agency.

C. F. Smith of Lamonia, Oregon, arrived here last week and took charge of the work on the C. S. L. Co's canal. The right of way has all been cleared and the entire force of men began grading, at a point about three miles from the head of the canal, and the work will be pushed with all the energy possible with a large force of men, teams and the necessary machinery. Mr. Smith, has a practical knowledge of this kind of work and will have the entire system of canals completed within a few months, if a sufficient number of men can be obtained to do the work.

## General News.

President Roosevelt has met a warm welcome in California from all classes.

Gardiner G. Howland, general manager of the New York Herald died at his home in N. Y. on May 9.

Post Office Inspector M. C. Fosnes has been placed in charge of the free delivery service, and General Superintendent Macher has been relieved from duty.

Three persons killed and several others seriously injured as a result of a head-on collision between two passenger trains on the N. Y. C. & H. R. Railroad on May 9.

John Simpson, of Eugene, Oregon, is having a mild case of smallpox for the second time. His Physicians call it smallpox and he declares that he had the same affliction two years ago.

The Armour Packing Company is buying both creamery and country butter in the Willamette Valley, and it is reported that they will purchase half a million pounds during the months of May and June.

The New York World, on May 10th, issued an edition of 136 pages the largest newspaper ever published, it was issued on the 26th anniversary under Mr. Pulitzer's management. Miss Katherine Helfrich of Lamonia, died in Portland on Tuesday May 5th, 1903, of a very severe case of smallpox. Miss Helfrich was staying at the Poindexter Hotel when the disease first broke out there, but left for Portland before that place was quarantined. She had been in Portland some time and was staying at the Imperial Hotel when she was taken sick she was removed from the hotel to the Pest-house on Monday and while she received the best of care the case was a very severe one from the start and she only lived a few days after taking sick. Miss Helfrich has been a resident of Crook County for several years, and most of that time has been actively engaged in newspaper work having only recently resigned as foreman of the Echo. She was an active worker, a forcible writer and a staunch supporter of republican principles. She leaves Father, Mother, several Brothers, and a host of friends to mourn her loss.
