We are enjoying the presence of two sawmills and a scarcity of lumber.

Wm. Stephens is erecting a residence for James Overton, this week, near this office.

The P. B. D. Co. has a force of men surveying and replatting the townsite of Bend.

M. C. Awbrey and O. Johnson made a trip to Prineville for supplies, this week.

Rev. Triplett preached to a large and appreciative audience at the school house last Sunday.

Frank Hodson now holds the record for best local fisherman having caught 118 last Monday.

J. A. Rayl, of Bear Creek Buttes, was in our city on Monday trying to dispose of about 25 ton of rye hay.

John Ryan and Mr. Chipman returned from a ten days cruise in the timber belt, the first of the week.

Mrs. Ora Pondexter, came out from Prineville and will remain here with her father for some time.

The Lake County quarantine was raised last Tuesday and our mail allowed to go through for the first time in several weeks.

It is reported that Don P. Rea, has resigned as Editor of the Bend Bulletin, and will be succeeded by J. M. Lawrence.

The Prineville Hotel, in Prineville, Oreg. was released from quarantine on Wednesday last after being thoroughly fumigated.

Forest fires are raging in the state of Pennsylvania, destroying millions of dollars worth of timber and devastating hundreds of homes.

C. A. Dennison formerly of this place, but now of Prineville, is not the victim of smallpox as reported in last week's issue of the Bend Bulletin.

A party of Bankers, Merchants and other business men from Portland spent several days in our city this week but have not fully decided on a business location yet.

C. S. Benson an attorney from Minnesota, spent several days in our city the first of this week and expects to return soon and locate here permanently.

Mr. C. L. Turey and family arrived in our city the first of the week, they came direct from Chippewa Falls Wisconsin, and will make this place their home for some time at least.

A party of eastern people spent two days here, this week, in re-examining timber claims that they had filed upon some time ago on which they are now ready to make final proof.

Prof. A. C. Hampton departed for his home at Monmouth, Oregon, the first of the week, the school having closed here. Mr. Hampton expects to return in the fall and teach here again next winter.

John Sisemore has not waited for government or private irrigation but has put his own system of ditches in fine shape for the coming season, and will reap the reward in a bountiful harvest next fall.

On Friday evening of last week Miss Marion Weist, entertained a party of young friends at her home, in this city, music, games and dancing was the order of the evening and all declared it one of the most enjoyable event of the season.

The family consisting of wife, daughter and son, of Mr. C. A. Dano arrived in our city from Minneapolis last Sunday. As it is impossible to rent a house in the city they will live in a tent for the present. Mr. Dano has been here for some time.

The public school closed here last Friday, two weeks before the regular term had expired. The reason assigned being smallpox. Part of the board and many of the patrons were not in favor of closing the school at this time as there is no cases nearer than Prineville.

John Steidl of the firm of Reed and Steidl has gone to Portland to purchase a Turbine water-wheel which they will install in their sawmill as soon as it is possible to get it here. As they have abandoned the former plan of running their mill with an old fashioned undershot water-wheel.

Last Saturday several of the young people of this place were out on a picnic and fishing excursion, while D. F. Steffel was standing on a log fishing he lost his balance and fell into the river, had he not caught on a rock he would have been carried over the rapids just below and could not possibly have escaped drowning. Mr. Hutchison, jumped in to rescue Mr. Steffel and had a narrow escape himself.

Wm. McVey, of Prineville, died on May 18, and was buried on the 19th. Mr. McVey's wife has been dead only a short time. Mr. McVey has been a resident of Prineville for several years and is well known throughout the county.

General News.

Last week a flow of artesian water was struck on the Blalock fruit farm, near Walla Walla, at a depth of 550 feet. The water runs 50 gallons per minute and comes to the surface with a temperature of 70 degrees. Scientific men have been trying for years to locate the artesian flow in the Walla Walla country. This means much for irrigation in that section and perhaps for Eastern Oregon as well for the artesian belt very likely covers a large territory.

The Mormon temple at Salt Lake City is no doubt the most substantial and well constructed religious edifice in the United States, if not in the world. Corner stone laid April 6, 1853, cap stone April 6, 1892 and dedicated April 6, 1893, over forty years of constant labor being consumed in its construction. This magnificent structure 200 feet long, 100 feet wide is built entirely

of Utah white granite, beautifully carved, symbolic of the Mormon faith, surmounted by six towers, the highest being 230 feet from the ground, supporting a bronze statue of the angel Maroni. The cost of this building is about \$6,000,000.

The inquiry for timber land is still unabated, but there will be a rude awakening some of these fine days. Those who have purchased lands and able to hold them will realize a fair profit on their investment, but those who are forced to sell in the near future must content themselves with a price which will not exceed fifty cents per thousand and will be fortunate to get \$700 to \$800 for their claims. There is

not one claim in five that will cut over two million feet of merchantable lumber and it follows that those who expected or thought they were getting claims that would cut three to four millions were sadly mistaken. The facts are that two millions to a claim of yellow pine is above average and 50 cents per thousand is a fair price and the sooner this is known the less disappointment there will be.

The above from the pen of a man who is well posted about timber may be nearer the facts than would at first appear.
