An unusual occurrence is that of the Shaniko-Prineville stage getting into Prineville before our mail stage leaves there. Such was the case Monday however and Bend people were reading the Sunday Oregonian within thirty-six hours after it left Portland.

C. E. Morrill returned from Prineville Thursday night accompanied by Dr. Daniels and another gentleman, from Rhinelander, Wis., who have timber interests up the river. They left yesterday for the timber but will return tomorrow night and spend several days at this place.

The work in connection with the changing of the county road, so as not to conflict with the ditch right-of-way of the Pilot Butte Development Company, will proceed next Monday, July 13th, when the viewers appointed by the County Court will examine the proposed new route and make their report.

Reed & Steidl are gradually sawing out lumber enough to enclose their mill. The water head has been raised eighteen inches during the week and about twice as much power generated as a result. The turbine wheel at present in use does not furnish sufficient power and another of same size is now on its way from Portland.

George Bates and family will leave next week for their homestead, west of Lava, where they will make their future home. During the summer Mr. Bates will construct flumes and ditches to irrigate about five acres of land which will give him a good start for raising crops next season. We wish Mr. Bates and family all kinds of good luck and hope that they will frequently visit Bend.

The erection of the Pilot Butte Development Company's mill three miles up the river has been delayed somewhat on account of the new boilers and engine not arriving. An almost entirely new mill is now assured as the management has decided to put in this new machinery which will more than double the cutting capacity. Among the new equipment will be a steam nigger for handling logs on the carriage. The greater part of the machinery of the old mill remains here and will probably be used in the planing mill. While awaiting the arrival of the new machinery a crew of men are at work cutting timber and it is expected that a good supply of logs will be on hand when the wheels start to turn. From the present outlook this will be in about ten days or two weeks.

The recently issued illustrated pamphlet descriptive of the resources of Oregon, Washington and Idaho published by the Passenger Departments of the O. R. & N. and the S. P. railroad companies contains a vast fund of information for the homeseeker from the East, but it does not contain a single word about Crook county and its wonderful resources in timber, farm and grazing lands. This county needs advertising but it is idle to expect it gratuitously from disinterested parties and, judging from the past, it is equally idle to expect it from those most interested, the people themselves. An immigration bureau ought to be established and an effort made to attract settlers by judicious advertising in the Eastern states. All the county papers do their best, but they reach only a comparatively few outsiders and sometimes tire of tooting the horn for the whole community without commendation or hope of reward.
