We have at our office a single stool of rye taken from John Sizemore's field, most of the stalks of which are seven and one half feet long, with a single stalk measuring eight feet. This grew on Mr. Sizemore's sub-irrigated field on the west side of the river and is only a fair sample of what the soil will produce.

The greater part of the work on J. I. West's building at Bend is completed and John Getz is now engaged in putting on the finishing touches and in building the fixtures for the meat market.

Mr. Getz is a first-class workman and "Dad" will have reason to feel proud of his place when it is formally opened to the public.

The surveying of the Bend townsite was completed this week and Engineer Weist now has his crew at work on the flume right-of-way up the river. This right-of-way will be fifty feet in width and water will be carried a distance of one

and a half miles by flume. The ditch which it flows into is designed to furnish a temporary water supply for the town as well as for irrigation purposes.

Messrs. Miller and Heising will serve ice cream and cake, and lemonade at the West building Sunday afternoon and evening from 1:30 to 7:30. Don't forget to call as these ladies have earned for themselves an enviable reputation as ice cream makers. They will also serve refreshments of this kind on the night of the Bend Mercantile Company's grand opening.
